Local and Other Items

DON'T MISS IT—What? The musical concert in the Lyceum on Wednesday evening. The programme is one that cannot fail to please. Proceeds in aid of St. Joseph's Convent.

A BICYCLE TAX—In Paris there is bicycle tax of six francs, and every wheel man must wear on the bicycle a plaque or circular disc of metal bearing a small head of the republic and the date 1899 in large letters. These must be renewed each year. Persons who fail to pay the tax and secure the disc are liable to summons and fine.

A TOWN OF OCTOGENARIANS—Chipping Ongar, a little Essex town, with a population of about 800, appears to be specially favored in regard to the longevity of its inhabitants. Dr. W. C. Clark, who has been personally investigating the facts bearing upon this theory, has found that in the one street of which Ongar can boast there are now living twelve persons, four of them ladies, whose united ages total 1,023 years. One is 83, one 92, one 90, one 87, two 86, two 84, three 83, and one 81.—Birmingham Post.

THE DEMAND FOR TIES—The American Lumberman estimates that the railroads of the United States will require during the year 1896 about 94,000,000 sleepers, of which 13,500,000 are assigned to the 5,000 miles of new railroad which it is estimated will be built. The demand for ties is now active everywhere. The Missouri Pacific has lately been using only about \$600,000 yearly, whereas its normal requirements aggregate 1,500,000 ties a year, and as many other roads have, no doubt, been economizing in this direction, the demand is believed to be likely to continue strong.

HOTEL IMPROVEMENTS—Mr. Archibald, of the Queen Hotel, has this season made a great many improvements in his popular hostelry. Prominent among these improvements is the introduction of a complete system of plumbing of the most approved description. Two bathrooms have been fitted with the latest things in that line, and four new closets have been placed in position. New tanks have also been put in, and air-shafts leading to the top of the building erected. The plumbing has been done in a first-class manner by Messrs Shaw & Bearist. Mr. Archibald is to be congratulated upon the good work he is doing in connection with the Queen, which now ranks with the best-conducted hotels in the Maritime Provinces.

Hide Inspection.

OTTAWA, May 12—A very large deputation, composed of tanners from all over the provinces of Ontario and Quebec, met on the 11th Joly de Lotbiniere and the Premier this morning, asking the compulsory inspection of hides. They were told that as two other deputations opposing their petition were coming up the Government would hear them all at a meeting to be held in the Premier's room this afternoon. Resolutions will be heard and the matter taken into consideration.

Universal Jubilee.

ROME, May 12—The Pope yesterday handed to Monsignor Marioli a bill declaring a universal jubilee in the year 1900. The bull was afterwards promulgated, according to custom, in the vestibule of St. Peter's, where Monsignor Bellaguarda read it aloud in the presence of the prelates and an enormous audience. The bull was then affixed to the doors of the Basilica.

Galicians Coming

EMBURG, May 12—The steerage quarters of the German-American liners are crowded with Galicians, who are emigrating to Canada and the United States in consequence of oppression and famine at home. Fully 50,000 are on their way or preparing to leave. The Patricia, the last steamship leaving for New York, took 2,500, and the Graf-Waldersee, the next vessel sailing, will carry 2,500 more. The bookings for future sailings are filled, and the North German Lloyd liners are similarly crowded.
