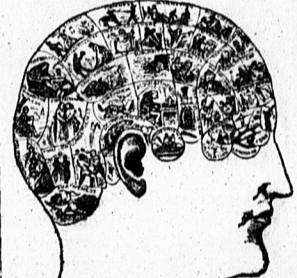

BOTTOMLEY HAD DISPOSED OF HIS INTEREST IN JOHN BULL

LONDON, June 12.—W. Grant Morden, presiding at a meeting of the Oldham Press, which owns the paper, John Bull, said the directors were much concerned over the grave charges against their former editor. The directors, before legal action was taken against Horatio Bottomley, decided they could not jeopardize the company's good name by retaining a man, however brilliant, whose actions were the subject of such charges. Arrangements were, therefore, made whereby Bottomley accepted £25,000 for his life interest in John Bull. It was, said Mr. Morden, a bold course, but the directors had then no idea of the extent of the prosecution and the subsequent results. Mr. Bottomley was recently sentenced to a long prison term for fraud.

**Bye-Laws**  
TOWN OF ALBERTON  
At a meeting of the Town Council of the Town of Alberton on April 22, 1922, the Provincial Automobile Act was adopted in toto, in addition to the following by-law: No person shall park an auto or motor vehicle on the Main Street of the town between Church street and Poplar street, except and unless the left side of the auto or motor vehicle shall be next to and close to the curbing of the street. Breaches of this bye-law shall be punished by a fine of not more than five dollars, together with the costs of securing conviction for the first offence, and ten dollars for each subsequent conviction.
