



### DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

Rogers Bell, son of Reg. Bell, M.L.A., Charlottetown, has very kindly remembered us by sending a June 30th program of Bay State Raceway, Norboro, Mass., with the comment: "Had a good time, big crowd and good racing." We notice in the 4th race Colonel Dan 2:07 2/5 was the favorite but he finished third for owner-driver Bob Ryan, and Royal Bank, owned by Frank A. Ryder, Moncton, and driven by Dannie Steele, was 5th in 2:08 3/5 in the 5th race.

The many admirers of Stanley Dancer whose driving exploits the past few years have been so remarkable, will regret to learn that he has had to curtail his activities and operate a smaller stable because of the strain imposed on him. He is 27 years of age and last season was third leading money winner with \$281,185 to his credit. Quite a number of the horses in his stable have been taken over and are being raced by Earle Avery and we understand that Earle has a total of 45 head that he is training and racing.

The most exciting racing news of the season so far was the winning of the first dash of the Free-For-All at Truro last week by the 6-year-old pacer Judge Miller in 2:07 3/5. We interested ourselves in looking him up and found that as a 4-year-old he made 31 starts, was six times first, ten times second and four times third, winning \$3,980 and last year he was eight times first, three times second and nine times third and won \$4,300

and reduced his record to 2:07. His sire is Miller Brook 2:04 1/4 by Justice Brook 3, 2:08 1/2. This horse has sired a lot of good performers and they have a reputation of being tough. The new owner is C. E. Bragg of Collingwood, N. S., who has been a good supporter of harness racing for years and now has the satisfaction of owning one of the fastest pacers in the Maritimes.

Just before Blue Bonnets Raceway closed until the fall season H. B. Chief, that equalled the world's record for pacing geldings in a race by pacing a mile in 1:58 3/5 at Lexington last year and was afterwards purchased by Joseph Cauchon of Quebec City, won both heats of the \$2,500 pacer derby driven by J. Giguere. The first heat in 2:04 4/5 was the fastest mile paced in Quebec—in fact in Canada—this season. He is by Chief Abbedalc 2:00 and last year headed many of the fastest horses racing in the United States. Mr. Cauchon was the man who bought Indian Land 1:59 4/5 when he was sold by Castleton Farm and Indian Land was the top horse in Quebec for some years but is now retired.

Just previous to the H. B. Chief's performance the 7-year-old Vic Song 2:02 3/5, record taken on a mile track, trotted the fastest mile in Canada this year when he won the Derby trot at Quebec City in 2:04 3/5. He is owned by P. E. Jobin of Quebec and was (Continued on page 7)

Gary "The German" Simon was everything they said about him. They said he had an awkward style hard to describe but he was aggressive, could punch well and he kept on top of his opponent all the time—and he was all of it. The fight was billed as a battle of the two top middleweights in the Maritimes and it turned out to be everything it was built up to be. Fight promoter Ivan Doherty deserves a lot of credit for being able to sponsor such a show. He could do a lot worse than rematch Simon and McCluskey on another fight card at some future date.

McCluskey was in the best shape of his career for the bout. It was fortunate that he was in top form or he would not have been able to weather the German's savage assault in the last round. Cobey fought a smart fight. He is a masterful counter-fighter, strong with a good left. Brothers Tom and Wilf were in his corner and any boxer would go a long way before he could find a better trainer than Tom McCluskey. Tom coached Cobey throughout, told him by signals when to spurt and when to work easily and Cobey followed his instructions to the sign.

As we saw it the fight was very close. The first two rounds were about even with the German being the aggressor but with McCluskey landing the better punches. McCluskey scored fairly often in the third round. The fourth and fifth were about even while McCluskey had a good sixth round and a fairly good seventh. The German took over in the eighth with a murderous assault. Cobey came back somewhat in the ninth but the German took nearly full control in the tenth. We gave the eighth, ninth and tenth rounds to Simon, the third, sixth and seventh to McCluskey and called the others even.

Fight manager Bob Talbot of Halifax saw McCluskey winning by a shade. "McCluskey outboxed Simon all during the early part of the fight," said Talbot. "Sure the German finished strong but you must remember that there are ten rounds to a fight." Another boxer saw Simon winning. "The decision by Edwards was the only good one," he stated. "Simon won by a mile."

One thing is certain in our minds. The main bout was the best we have seen in a long time. There were two great fighters in the ring, fighting for the chance to meet Charlie Chase in a Dominion title fight. From what we saw the two men are about equal as far as ability is concerned. McCluskey is the better boxer, Simon the better puncher.

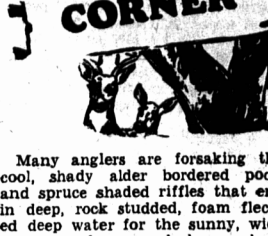

### HUNTERS' CORNER



Many anglers are forsaking the cool, shady alder bordered pools and spruce shaded riffles that dot in deep, rock studded, foam flecked deep water for the sunny, wide expanse of seaward bars where the tide whispers and the gulls wheel in a blue sky. Why? Do you hear someone ask. Because nowadays trout have a rough passage from salt water to the desired haven of tonic laden spring water. Those that do make it do not last long. Jigs, snares, pitch forks, lime, explosives, nets—anything goes. The motto of many today seems to be: "If they won't take bait, artificial flies or other lures we'll take trout home regardless!" Some just take along a rod as a blind and toss the "jig" into the bushes if they see or hear anyone coming.

Salt water angling for trout requires time and infinite patience. Seldom does an angler reel many trout and more often than not its a case of "no score." Not long ago I talked to a confirmed salt water angler. He told me on the average one trip in three was a blank and often one trout is all he takes home. If he reels three or four in as many hours fishing he considers himself lucky. On the odd occasion he hits pay dirt and has action galore. He confided that seldom does he land a trout under three quarters of a pound and three and four pounders are not uncommon. He admitted this type of angling did not furnish the action one gets in a good fresh water pool, or used to get, but if one wants sea trout the surest way is to intercept them before they reach the area where the water is shallow and the stream boundaries more confined.

I do not think that trout fishing in shady, remote fresh water streams will ever lose its appeal even if the supply of trout keeps falling off. I also feel certain there are more trout in our inland trout pools than is generally realized but they are so terrorized and hounded it takes only the vibration of approaching foot steps (Continued on page 7)

### Islanders Will Continue In Maritime Major Hockey

The Islanders will definitely continue a team in Maritime Major League or Senior League hockey, it was decided last night at a special meeting at the Forum. The motion was moved by Bob MacDonald and seconded by Emmet Coyle. The vote was almost unanimous that the Club continue operations. The meeting also marked the return of Dr. F. C. Dougan to the hockey scene as a member of the Islanders executive. Although not present Dr. Dougan was voted chairman of a four man nominating committee with the understanding that the four men would remain on the executive. The four are Dr. Dougan, Charlie Praught, Paul Williams and Bob MacDonald. They have the power of appointing four more men to act with them on the executive. It was revealed at the meeting by Club President Smith MacFarlane that the Islanders had a net loss of about \$10,000 for the past year's operations. Mr. MacFarlane pointed out that this figure was only a rough estimate. The actual figure could not be determined as work on the books has not been completed. For the past four years of operation the Islanders have a deficit of about \$20,000. About one-half of this amount is owed the Forum, it was indicated. The next meeting of the Maritime Major Hockey League will be held in New Glasgow on July 17. At that time clubs entering the League must post a bond of \$500. It was pointed out by Walter Lawlor last night, contracts for the coming season should be in the hands of last year's team members by August 1, otherwise the players would be free agents.

MacDonald struck out 12 of the 18 batters he faced in tossing his history-making no-hitter. The Kensington team also won the second game of the double header, defeating the Phillies 5-3. G. Thibreau was the winning pitcher and Sterling Ladder, closer. P. MacDonald, the boy who hurled the no-hitter in the opening game, hit a double in the second contest.
