TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.]

The Eastern War Cloud.

PARIS, Oct. 23.

The Journal des Debats says Austria and Russia have agreed that personal union shall be granted to Bulgaria and Eastern Roumelia; that Prince Alexander shall be deposed, and that Bulgaria shall cede the Western District to Servia. The Turkish Government is expected to acquiesce to this arrangement.

LONDON, Oct. 23.

A despatch from Cotinge says the Official Gazette contains an order forbidding any one to leave Montenegrin territory without the permission of the Government. Three Bulgarian monks and one nun who were secretly collecting funds to promote a revolt in Macedonia, have been arrested in St. Petersburg.

SOPIA, Oct. 23.

The Prefect of Widdur reports that two companies of Servian troops have occupied the heights at the extreme point of the frontier.

Riel's Case

LONDON, Oct. 23.

The Telegraph, commenting on Riel's case, says: "On the whole, yesterday's judgment is upheld by reason and common sense from lawyers of such undoubted authority that it may be assumed to cover the justice of the case. The end of the chapter now rests with Canada. Riel cannot complain if Canada, now master of the situation, exacts the last penalty."

The Times says: "The judgment in the Riel case leaves Canada free to act as she thinks best. It is the universal opinion in England that Riel deserves death, and if executed the justice of the decision will not be questioned here."

PARIS, Oct. 23.

M. Rochefort to-day published an article in L'Intransigent, defending the action of Louis Riel, leader of the half breed insurrection in the North-West Territory, and attacking in a scurrilous manner Queen Victoria and the Prince of Wales. The latter part of the article has greatly angered the English colony in Paris and the best circles in French society.

The Burmese Troubles

PARIS, Oct. 23.

The Burmese Envoy yesterday handed a note to Lord Lyons, British Ambassador, in which he stated he had sent a despatch to his government, advising them to accept arbitration for the settlement of the dispute with England, and he was certain they would be glad to restore friendly relations with Great Britain. He said: "European residents in Burmah were perfectly safe. The people of that country had no desire to be hostile to England."

RANGOON, Oct. 23.

An envoy from Mandalay has arrived here. He is ostensibly en route to Germany to sign a treaty, but it is more likely that he came here to see what military preparations are being made to enforce the Indian Government's demands upon Burmah.

Madagascar Troubles.

PARIS, Oct. 23.

A despatch to the Temps from Tamatave, giving details of the recent engagement between the French and Hovas, says that Admiral Miot, the French commander, met with unexpected opposition, and was compelled to beat a hasty retreat. The same despatch says that if the campaign in Madagascar be allowed to drag, the French will be driven into the sea.

Removal of Chinese.

STOCKTON, Cal., Oct. 23.

A meeting of 300 citizens, held here last evening, adopted resolutions demanding the removal of Chinatown from the city limits, and pledging those present to vote against all nominees at the city elections on Nov. 3, not pledged to removal of Chinatown.

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.

The Hanlon and Teemer race will be rowed between 2.30 and 4.30 to-morrow afternoon.

WATERTOWN, N. Y., Oct. 23.

Courtney and Conley rowed another race at Silver Lake to-day, Courtney winning.

OTTAWA, Oct. 23.

Lord Lansdowne, after making a brilliant speech at Winnipeg, left for Ottawa at noon to-day.

The Timber Limits were sold by the Ontario Government yesterday for \$500,000.

The Fitzpatrick Murder.

The Examination Continued.

The Prisoners Discharged.

IMPORTANT TESTIMONY.

The examination was resumed yesterday evening, when the following evidence was heard:—

CHARLES SAUNDERS (sworn)—Evidence same as before. Coroner.

MICHAEL MCADAM was called and examined by Mr. Davies. He said: I was in the field from about 9 in the morning till 12 o'clock. I went back after dinner I went for a little while and then went over to Emma's for a while. I came back before the boys came. I did not drink any that day. I swear I was not drunk and that I did not drink any that day.

JOHN CONLEY (sworn)—Evidence same as before. Coroner, and in addition said: When I was returning from the field where I was working I passed Fitzpatrick's, and as two of my cows were in his cabbage, I called out to his children and some of them came out and drove them out.

Cross-examined by Mr. Davies—I saw deceased Saturday afternoon, and he told me that it was not Beales who shot him.

Court adjourned till this morning.

The examination of the prisoners was continued at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon.

The Attorney General stated that there were a number of important witnesses to be examined, and he requested that the evidence be heard with closed doors.

His Honor said it was perfectly legal to have the examination private, and he therefore ordered that the Court be cleared.

The Court was then cleared, no one being admitted but the Clerk of the Crown and counsel for the defence.

The evidence of Mrs. David Euman and Mr. David Euman, of Argyle Shore the parties who saw the murder committed, and who spoke to the boy after he was shot, was then taken.

Mrs. Euman gave a thrilling account of the murder; but her evidence will not, in the interests of justice, be published until the murderers are arrested. Her husband corroborated her statement in every particular.

Their evidence completely exonerated the boys, Frank Beales and Arthur Smith.

On motion of Mr. Davies, by consent of the Attorney General, and after a declaration of their innocence of the crime by the Stipendiary Magistrate, they were released.

The scene at the residence of Mr. Beales as his son entered and was received in the arms of his mother was most affecting. Those who witnessed it could not refrain from shedding tears. The scene at Arthur Smith's home was equally affecting.

The boys are to be congratulated on the manner in which they bore the trial. Their behaviour throughout the examination denoted that they were as innocent of the crime of which they were charged as the child unborn.

The evidence of Mrs. Euman and her husband was a clear description of the atrocious murder and the man who committed it. Their evidence will, with that already accumulated by the police, be sufficient to bring the parties who committed the wanton crime speedily to justice.

On information received, a young man named Joseph Fisher, of Bannockburn, was arrested in connection with the murder. He is now in jail awaiting examination. His companion is still at large, but the police are on his track.
