

# Milk Products Production Has Increase For This Year

OTTAWA (CP) — Production of cheddar cheese, ice-cream mix and skim milk powder was higher in both September and the first nine months of 1965 than in comparable periods of last year, the bureau of statistics reports.

Production of creamery butter and evaporated whole milk was down.

The bureau reported September production of creamery butter was 34,719,000 pounds, compared with 36,909,000 a year ago.

Cheddar cheese output was 16,503,000 pounds, compared with 15,861,000; ice-cream mix, 2,072,000 gallons compared with 2,072,000; evaporated whole milk, 27,708,000 pounds compared with 26,108,000; and skim milk powder, 22,478,000 pounds compared with 20,147,000.

In the nine months period, production this year and last year was: Creamery butter, 275,443,000 pounds compared with 285,601,000; cheddar cheese, 118,251,000 pounds compared with 113,411,000; ice-cream mix, 30,634,000 gallons compared with 30,224,000; evaporated whole milk, 251,130,000 pounds compared with 200,316,000; and skim milk powder, 180,304,000 pounds compared with 163,386,000.

## NEW BACTERIA KILLING PLAN IS ANNOUNCED

LONDON (Reuters)—A revolutionary method of killing bacteria by using only 1-30 of present drug doses has been announced in London.

Two doctors, a Briton and an Indian, who made the discovery after four years' research at a London hospital, said it is a major breakthrough.

They are Dr. Raja Srivastava and Dr. R. E. M. Thompson, both of the pathology laboratory in Middlesex Hospital.

Srivastava said they have found that bacteria-like organisms, are most susceptible to disease when very young or very old.

In tests, the doctors synchronized the life cycle of bacteria by bringing them into a state of hibernation, enabling 90 per cent to be killed off at once. Shortly afterwards, the process was repeated and the other 10 per cent were knocked out.

In Middlesex Hospital a spokesman said results were checked carefully before being announced, adding: "The claims are absolutely beyond doubt."

## Department Store Sales Increase

OTTAWA (CP) — Department store sales were nearly seven per cent higher two weeks ago than in the corresponding week of last year, the bureau of statistics reports.

Sales were 8.1 per cent higher in the Atlantic provinces, 15.6 per cent higher in Quebec, 15.6 per cent higher in Ontario and 3.6 per cent higher in Alberta.

These more than offset declines of 2.8 per cent in Manitoba, seven per cent in Saskatchewan, and 5.3 per cent in British Columbia.

## MORE PROCESS CHEESE

Production of process cheese from a cheddar or other cheese base rose 15 per cent in September to 8,384,993 pounds from a year earlier, bringing the January-September output to 56,320,065 pounds, more than 10 per cent greater than in the first nine months of 1964.

Margarine production fell in September to 16,495,000 pounds from 17,021,000 a year earlier. Production in nine months this year totalled 122,767,000 pounds compared with 125,306,000 in the first nine months of last year.

Stocks of creamery butter and cheddar cheese were smaller at Oct. 1 this year, while stocks of other dairy products were higher than a year ago.

Oct. 1 stocks, with last year's figures in brackets, were: Creamery butter, 107,655,000 pounds (137,322,000); Cheddar cheese, 78,486,000 pounds (74,214,000); evaporated whole milk, 66,671,000 pounds (53,781,000); skim milk powder 49,942,000 (40,073,000); and poultry meat, 41,982,000 (41,776,000).

This psychological battle, all in the spirit of the game, produces repercussions. Sometimes one side triumphs, sometimes the other. This deal shows a singleton.
