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Maritime Potato King Tries "Baked Potato Special"

Seventh Island Potato Champion At Winter Fair

AMHERST, N. S., Oct. 31 — The eighth potato king of the Maritime Winter Fair Potato Show is J. Reid Underhay of Souris P. E. I., whose prize-winning sample of Bliss Triumph potatoes was awarded the grand championship over all other varieties at the show. Mr. Underhay also won the special cash prize of \$125, donated by the Canadian Industries (1954) Limited.

Mr. Underhay is the third generation on the family farm while his son, Leslie, now in partnership with his father, makes the fourth generation to operate the ancestral acres. With 100 acres of cleared land the Underhay's grow some 15 acres of seed potatoes each year. The championship sample came from a 5 1-2 acre field while the balance was planted to the Irish Cobbler and Sebago varieties. They follow the usual spraying program, putting on three to five sprays, depending upon the weather during the growing season. They grow potatoes on both sod and stubble, but it so happened this year that the Bliss Triumph field was planted on stubble, while one ton of 5-10-10 fertilizer per acre.

A herd of Yorkshire cattle, York-shire hogs, Oxford and north country cheviot sheep and a flock of 100 laying hens makes this a typical Maritime mixed farm.

Mr. and Mrs. Underhay have two sons and three daughters. The second son is taking an Arts degree at the University of Toronto with the present intention of going into the ministry. Mrs. Athol MacBeath, Marshfield, P. E. I., is their married daughter, while a second daughter is a school teacher and the third is in training for a nurse.

It is of interest to all Maritime potato growers, and of special interests to P. E. I. growers that this is the seventh consecutive year that the high honor of Maritime Potato King has been awarded to a Prince Edward Island grower and the fifth time that the honor has gone to a grower in the Eastern section of the Island. Top honors in the first year of this contest, making eight in all, went to W. A. Flemming of Truro.
