

# P.E.I. Pollution Loss Said Above \$3 Million

OTTAWA (CP) — Canadians squander an estimated \$1,163,000,000 worth of natural resources yearly by allowing them to become polluted, the Canadian Institute on Pollution Control was told here.

Christian de Laet of Montreal, secretary-general of the Canadian Council of Resource Ministers, said at the closing session of the institute's three-day conference:

"Each cluster of Canadians is primarily concerned with its own problems. But in terms of environmental pollution they all have one thing in common. Collectively, they are squandering vast fortunes."

Mr. de Laet said experts in his secretariat have recently compiled statistics about Canada's loss through pollution. They estimated, in dollars and cents, the annual losses from water, air and soil pollution in Canada. They came to the staggering total of \$1,163,000,000 or approximately \$494 per person per year."

**HEAD FOR HOME**

The number of delegates to the pollution control meeting, which had reached over 600 at the convention's height, dwindled to 75 at Wednesday's closing session as members began leaving for their homes across the country.

Mr. de Laet said the figures he quoted in dollars-and-cents loss to Canada through pollution are "based on experienced judgment by the experts on the relative per capita cost of water, air and soil pollution."

He gave the total estimated annual loss from environmental pollution by provinces: Newfoundland \$20,800,000; Prince Edward Island \$3,300,000; Nova Scotia \$49,300,000; New Brunswick \$38,600,000; Quebec \$370,800,000; Ontario \$437,500,000; Manitoba \$47,500,000; Saskatchewan \$42,500,000; Alberta \$71,300,000; British Columbia \$91,800,000.

"These figures are very impressive, and as our population increases, as our industry grows, and as the demands on our water, air and land become ever greater, these figures will grow proportionately."

The pollution control institute's annual meeting was closed by the newly-elected president, William N. Swann of Ebiocote, Ont.

## Housing Starts Down For Sept.

OTTAWA (CP) — Central Mortgage and Housing Corp. has reported that construction started on 11,297 new houses and apartments in urban areas during September.

Housing starts in urban and rural areas in the first nine months of the year numbered 118,061.

The September figure for urban centres was down nearly three per cent from September last year, but the nine-month total for urban and rural areas was up more than seven per cent.

CMHC said the September pace of housing construction represented an annual rate of 134,300 units when seasonal variations were smoothed out. This rate is down markedly from 177,500, the rate of August starts which was unusually high.

# Woman And Neighbor Boy Charged In Torture Death

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (AP)—A mother of seven children and a 15-year-old neighbor boy were being held here on preliminary charges of murder in the torture death of the 16-year-old daughter of a carnival family.

Homicide Detective Sgt. William Kaiser said the words "I am a prostitute and proud of it" had been scratched on the abdomen of the girl, Sylvia Marie Likens, with a needle and that she had been beaten repeatedly.

Mrs. Gertrude Wright, 37, with whom the girl had been left while her parents were travelling, insisted the girl stumbled into the backyard of the Wright home here Tuesday night and said she had been attacked by a gang of boys.

But Kaiser, said, 15-year-old Richard Hobbs, the neighbor boy, related a gruesome story of Miss Likens being imprisoned in the Wright basement for a week and repeatedly beaten with a poker and curtain rods while filth was rubbed on her face.

Death was attributed to a head injury after police were called Tuesday night and Dr. Arthur P. Kebel, deputy coroner, conducted an autopsy.

Mrs. Wright and Hobbs appeared before city judge Harry F. Zaklan this morning and were held without bond. The case was postponed until Monday.

Kaiser said the Hobbs boy said in an oral statement that several of the Wright children took part in the attacks on the girl.

Sgt. Kaiser said one of the Wright children, a girl, related that her mother and the Hobbs boy bound and gagged the victim about a week ago, "with the aid of three of the children."

## PRINCE CHARLIE SAID IN LOVE

PARIS (Reuters) — The weekly newspaper France Dimanche says Prince Charles is being sent to school in Australia because he has fallen in love with a Scottish farmer's daughter.

The paper, which specializes in sensational stories about persons in high society, says the 17-year-old British prince met the girl, Juliette, in a cafe at Elgin, near his school at Gordonstoun in Northern Scotland.

(In London, a Buckingham Palace spokesman said today: "The prince is going to Australia to study in the normal course of his education and for no other reason.")

It was officially announced earlier this month that Charles would become a pupil for 3½ months at Geelong grammar school, one of Australia's leading academies.

## GM Earnings Reach Record

NEW YORK (AP)—General Motors Corp., the world's largest manufacturing firm, has reported record earnings of \$1,539,000,000, or \$5.38 a share, for the nine months ended Sept. 30.

The earnings were produced by record sales volume of \$14,858,000,000.

Sales of cars and trucks also were at a record level of 5,301,951 units for the nine-month span.

Third quarter results also were at high levels, officials reported. GM earned \$264,000,000 in the third quarter and earnings per common share were 31 cents a share. Earnings were up 19 per cent from the \$222,000,000 earned in the 1964 third quarter, when per-share earnings were 77 cents a share. Sales totalled \$3,743,000, up 14 per cent from sales of \$3,291,000 in the corresponding 1964 period.

It was the second record sales and earnings report by a major auto company in 24 hours. Ford Motor Co. reported Monday it had nine-month earnings of \$540,200,000, up 34 per cent from the 1964 level.

Chrysler Corp. earnings are due today.

Campaign director Frank Jones said in an interview Wednesday the error cannot be corrected in time by the printers and that "financial" will have to be written in ink on every copy by the candidates or their campaign workers.

**BIG GUN MISFIRED**

The records, believed a "first" in federal elections, constitute the "big gun" in Social Credit's printed campaign material and were scheduled to be passed out to voters across Canada well before the Nov. 8 vote.

In all 50,000 copies were printed and the first 20,000 copies were corrected earlier in various printing plants in western Canada, Mr. Jones said.

Mr. Thompson was understandably nettled over the snafu, he added, but everything was being done to clear up the confusion.

The omission of the word "financial" is significant because it wrongly suggests that Social Credit advocates a federal takeover of education.

Because of an error by the party's public relations advisers, the 50,000 record jackets came out reading, "responsibility for education must fall largely on the federal government," instead of "financial responsibility."

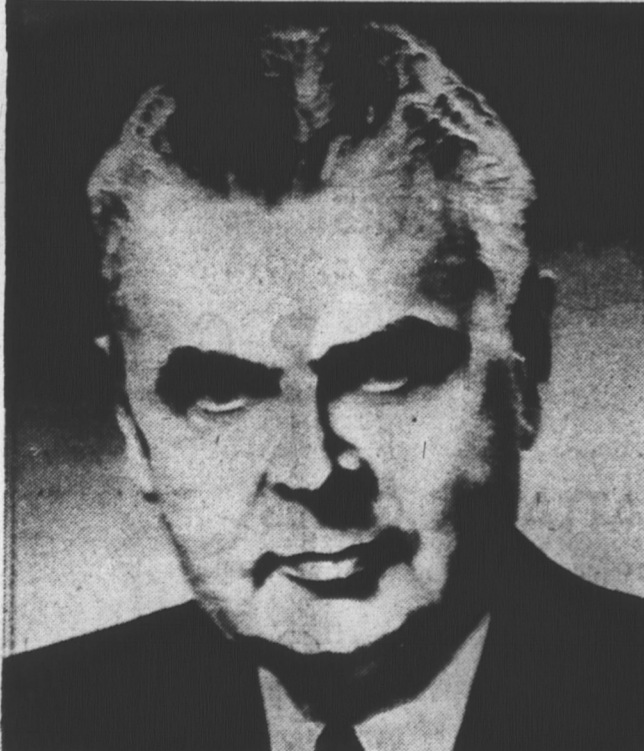
