Annual Meeting Of Second Queens County Conservatives

James D. MacDonald, of Nine Mile Creek, was re-elected president of the Progressive Conservative Association of Second Queens at a rousing annual meeting held in Clyde River Hall on August 6th.

Other officers elected were: Vice-president, Eugene McQuillen, of Riverside; secretary-treasurer, Lloyd MacPhail, New Haven; Emmett Gallant, North Rustico, was named as County executive member, and Reagh Bagnall, Hunter River, was appointed to the Provincial executive.

The president, in his report, cited a year's work completed with satisfactory results. By winning the Federal election, the value of team work was demonstrated. He predicted the next task, namely winning the Provincial election, should be much easier.

Heath N. Macquarrie, M.P. expressed thanks and appreciation for the great support the district gave him on election day. He noted that the responsibilities of office are heavy indeed in administering the affairs of this great country. Mr. Macquarrie held high hopes for the government and for Canada under the auspices of the new government, and predicted that the coming session will be one of the finest in Canada's history because each party realizes the importance of how they play their roles. He welcomed the prospect of a new look at British Commonwealth relations as Mr. Diefenbaker has promised.

In his closing remarks, Mr. Macquarrie stated that he wanted, needed, and valued the remarks and opinions of constituents from all walks of life. Frank Myers, M. L. A., in speaking briefly, said that the cloud overshadowing us for 22 years is now moving away and that we should always continue to place Canada and P.E.I. first and the Party second.

J. Philip Matheson, Queen's County President, paid tribute to loyalty to P.C. workers of this district and reviewed events that brought Angus MacLean and Heath Macquarrie into politics. Mr. Matheson paid tribute to Mr. Bell for his long service to the party.

R.R. Bell, M.L.A. congratulated the successful candidates in the Federal election and stressed the weight that our members will now have at Ottawa. He noted the loss of control of the Liberal government on the

U.S. with respect to potatoes, and expressed his hope for a better marketing of our potatoes under the new government.
