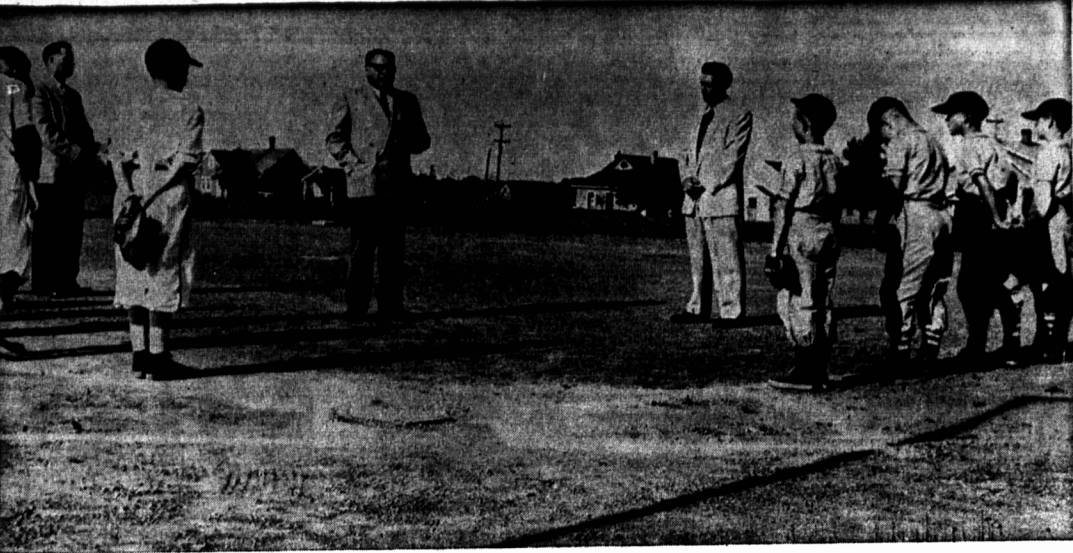

Mr. MacDonald, who had spent Wednesday evening at home with his family, was overcome by a heart attack shortly after retiring for the night and died very suddenly and quietly before medical help could be summoned.

Mr. MacDonald was born Aug. 28, 1888, and was the son of Mrs. John A. MacDonald, Spring Street, and the late Mr. MacDonald. He served in both world wars and was discharged from military service after the Second World War as a disability pensioner. He had been employed for a number of years in the United States between the two conflicts.

He was a member of the Summerside Presbyterian Church. Besides his mother, he leaves to mourn his wife, the former Margaret Gillis, five children: Mrs. A. S. McAssey, Mrs. Rod Crocker of Saskatoon, Sask.; Jack, Betty, George, Mary and Joyce. Mrs. Fred Lenhart, Denver, Colo., a daughter by a previous marriage. Two sisters, Ruby, Mrs. R. A. Abbott, Denver, Colo., and Vera, Mrs. A. S. McAssey, Summerside, also survive.

But Warmer Weather Forecast

Ont. Gets Brief Respite From Heat

TORONTO (CP) — A brief breather in southern Ontario's eight-day heat wave was experienced Thursday when temperatures dropped to a tolerable 83 in Toronto, but the thermometer is expected to shoot up again today. A high of 93 is forecast and the humidity is also expected to rise from Thursday's comfortable 40. Weather officials said. A mercury reading of 78 is average for this time of year.

Supervising coroner Dr. Smirle Lawson officially blamed the heat prostration killed a bricklayer, Tomasso Morizo, 24, and the deaths of two other men were attributed to heart conditions aggravated by Wednesday's high temperatures. No break in the hot spell is seen by forecasters.

The scorching has produced a Toronto situation described as "ridiculous," with authorities differing over water-conservation policies. WATERING IS HOT ISSUE — Residents of several suburbs, particularly North York, have been restricted from watering their lawns and gardens. Toronto's Mayor Nathan Phillips asked city residents to conserve water to all-out pressure to build up in the outlying areas.

The city clerk George Weale discovered a by-law prohibiting lawn-watering after 8.30 p. m. The mayor advised citizens to water their lawns on alternate evenings. The clerk inserted advertisements in newspapers requesting watering at different times.
