REPORT OF MR. McQUEEN, TENANT FARMER DELEGATE, ON PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND. Saturday, October 3rd.—Left Halifax in the morning for Prince Edward Island, the cars being very crowded.

Monday, October 5th.—Started on our inspection of the Island about half-past eight in a drizzling rain, under the guidance of the Premier, the Hon. Fred. Peters. First visited the farm of Mr. B. Heartz, where we saw a number of first-rate horses.

Proceedings in Parliament.

Mr. McQueen's Report.

An Interesting Narrative.

(Special Correspondence of The Examiner.)

Our weather is cooler than when I wrote last, but we are having a lot of rain—too much, I fear. Yesterday (Sunday) it rained all day and spoiled the Corpus Christi procession both here and in Montreal.

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METHODIST CONFERENCE.

MINISTERIAL CONFERENCE.

THURSDAY, June 23 d.

THE ministerial conference opened yesterday afternoon. About fifty ministers responded to the roll call.

Rev T Marshall, secretary, reported the transfer of Rev Wm Dobson to the Nova Scotia Conference in order that he may go to Bermuda; the transfer of the Rev J Parkinson from the Newfoundland Conference; the transfer of the Rev T B Duron to the Methodist Episcopal Church; the transfer of Rev W A Taylor, B.A., and the Rev J C Wells.

The following probationers were recommended for ordination: Reva G M Young and Frank Frizzle, from the St John district; Rev J B Gough, from the Fredericton district.

The probationers of three years are Reva J B Young from the Fredericton district; A D McLeod from P E Island. The probationers of two years are Rev S A Bailey from the Fredericton district; Rev A E Chapman, A.B., from the St. Stephen district. Rev W P Read was passed as a two year man. The probationers of one year are Reva Daniel B Bailey and Hedley D Marc from the St. John district.

Rev H Gilbert was given permission to rest for one year on account of ill health. The Reva J McNeill, B.A., Leo Wason and Geo A Sellers were recommended from the Fredericton district. Rev H. Wason was discontinued on account of ill health. Rev J T George was recommended to be continued on probation from the Miramichi district, Rev John Dimplo from the St. Stephen district, and Rev Henry Harrison from the St. Stephen district. Rev W C Matthews was continued on trial as having travelled one year.

The Statistics committee report an addition of 174 members for the year, the largest increase being in the district of Sackville. The total membership under the conference is nearly 12,000.

FORENOON SESSION.

The President in the chair. After singing prayer was offered by Reva D Chapman and W J Kirby. Rev G W Fisher, the rural secretary, read the minutes of the previous day which, after some amendments, were adopted.

The name of Rev Ernest Gough, from the Fredericton District, was passed as a probationer of two years' standing.

The following candidates for the ministry were received,—from the Fredericton District, Rev J Benj Howard and Havellock Gillespie; from the Sackville district, the Reva Edmund A Ramsay and W A Thomson, each of which were allowed a year on their probation.

The Supernumeraries are: From the St. John District:—Reva Dr Wilson, Henry Daniel, Dr Pope, James R Narraway, Samuel W Sprague, James A Duke, Wm Tweedie, Edwin Evans and John J Colter. From the Fredericton District: The Rev Geo E Fayson was passed. From the Sackville District: The Rev F W Harrison is compelled on account of ill health to seek a supernumerary relation. The Reva John Prince, Joseph Pascoe, Et phen T Teed and A C Lepage were also passed.

After this, the request of Rev. A. Lucas, together with the official documents from the New Brunswick Sunday School Association, was taken into consideration. The Field Secretary for another year was brought before the conference by the secretary, Dr. Sprague moved that the conference accede to the petition of Rev. W. B. Thomas, J. Shenton, D. Stewart and other spoke against it. Rev. G. Steel spoke in favor of it. Conference adjourned the further discussion until the afternoon session.

Dr. Stewart pronounced the benediction.
