One of the most encouraging features of this year's livestock exhibition at the Charlottetown Exhibition is the presence of a large number of new exhibitors. Almost every breed will have breeders who will be making their appearance for the first time in the show ring.

Everything is in readiness for the opening of the Exhibition and Old Home Week which takes place tonight at 7:00 Standard Time.

The big fair, which is now recognized as the largest in Canada east of Toronto, will be officially opened by Mr. Cyrus Eaton of Ohio. Opening remarks will be heard from the President of the Exhibition Association, Dr. J. P. Lantz, His Honor Lieutenant Governor T. W. L. Prowse, Hon. A. W. Matheson, Premier, His Worship Mayor J. D. Stewart of Charlottetown and Mr. W. R. Shaw, former Deputy Minister of Agriculture.

Wendell Rodd from Brookfield will be one of the new exhibitors in the Holstein breed and will compete with such veterans as Lewis Bros., from York, with 24 in their herd, R. A. Proffitt, Free-town, Cyril Jones, Banbury, Oswald Newson and Son, Kingston, and Colby Lewis, Free-town.

A motion to recommend to the Water Commissioners that fluoridation of the city water be adopted was lost in City Council yesterday when it was opposed by several of the Councillors after being introduced by Councillor Gordon Hutcheson.

A new proposal that the city make a yearly grant of \$1000 to the new killing plant for meat inspection purposes was suggested to the City Council yesterday by Mr. Woodrow Wheatley, who has long advocated the erection of a public killing plant with adequate inspection supervision.

An inquest at Lennox Island last evening into the death of Urban Francis Mitchell, 42, whose body was found in the water near the Port Hill wharf, August 3rd, was adjourned by Coroner W. A. Shea of Alberton until Monday, August 16th, when a jury failed to agree on a verdict. One dissenting juror resulted in the discharge of the jury and a new jury is to be sworn in before Monday, August 16th.

—On or about September 15 the Central Navigation School at R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside, will be moved from this station and the air training branch of C.N.S. will go to Winnipeg and the standards section will go to R.C.A.F. Station at Trenton, Ont.

Although it has been expected for some time that when this move is made the search and rescue unit from Greenwood, N.S., would move in, there now appears to be no official confirmation forthcoming to this effect.

—Mr. Percy Yeo, president, presided at a Progressive Conservative nominating convention for the Second District of Prince held at the O'Leary public hall last evening with an excellent attendance. A short address by Mr. Yeo was followed by a call for nominations for assemblyman.

WEDNESDAY

"A most outstanding display of beef cattle" was the description given by Mr. Reg Barbeau of Clarence, N.S., who judged the Hereford, Red Pole and Angus breeds at the Provincial Exhibition yesterday.

The competition in both the Angus and Herefords was limited to two exhibitors with one exhibitor in each breed having all the entries except in one class. However, the splendid display of Herefords by Sardonson and Borden of North River; and the sleek black and red Angus of Redverse Stewart and Son from Mulgrave Farm, Loyalist, gained the appreciation of the large audience gathered in the new Coliseum which showed its usefulness when inclement weather cancelled other parts of the first day's show.

Some of the top breeders in Eastern Canada will be competing for honors in the Guernsey ring at the Provincial Exhibition here today. Records speak for themselves and they speak in pleasing terms of such men as Guy Rodd of Brackley and Eric Hurry of Winslow. More recent entries except in one class, are such men as Ernest F. Colles and Son of Milton and Harold Palmer of Kensington. Both men have in their stables animals that drew honorable mention in All Canadian awards. Another breeder, Daniel MacLean of Milton, has a most unusual claim to fame in production circles. All of these breeders are showing here today.

MacLean had just about called it quits on Sunday. A painful accident suffered during having made it difficult to get his cattle in to the show. But Monday morning the MacLean cattle were

trucked to the grounds. Today they were ready to show with the others.

The culinary skill of P.E.I. women is ever growing. The number of entries in the domestic class of the Exhibition is any indication.

The highest record of entries ever made in this class totalled nearly 700, when entries closed noon yesterday. Sponsored by the Women's Institutes of this Province, this keenly-contested class includes foods ranging from fruit cakes to canned tomato juice—all home prepared!

Judging the domestic class this year were four busy ladies: Miss Alle Prowse, Brackley; Mrs. Willard Prowse, Brackley; Mrs. William Reddin, Tea Hill, and Miss Betty MacMurdo, Summerside.

—The regular weekly meeting of the Summerside Rotary Club was held last evening at 6:15 at Howard's Restaurant with president J. C. (Bud) Mountain in the chair. Dr. Kingsley Grady of Vancouver B.C., who is spending a two-week vacation in Summerside with his daughter, was a welcome guest at the meeting which was addressed by Rotarian Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell of Summerside.

THURSDAY

High quality cattle and some of the keenest competition seen here in years marked the Holstein exhibit at the big provincial fair here yesterday. While it poured rain most of the day and the atmosphere was unpleasant outside, the large crowd around the judging ring in the new Coliseum were able to watch in comfort and enjoy the keen battles that were being fought by the competing breeders and showmen.

A hurried check indicates that Lewis Brothers of York retained their honors as top showmen in the number of classes won. But they were given a terrific run by their father and brother, Colby C. Lewis and Son. The father-son team combined had almost as many class victories and they excelled in championship winnings.

Mr. Almon Boswell, Marshfield, and Mr. S. C. Stewart & Son, of Frenchfort, were top honor winners at yesterday's sheep exhibition which was described by the judge, Mr. Art Chapman of Waterloo, Quebec, as "outstanding".

The noted Waterloo sheep breeder owns a herd of 380 sheep comprised of 5 different breeds. Each year he sends a large number of his pure bred stock to all parts of Canada for breeding purposes. "The Shropshire exhibit," said Mr. Chapman, "was outstanding and the Cheviots were real good." He was particularly impressed with the lambs which he found in excellent condition in spite of the long period of wet weather experienced. He thought the show was well up to anything he had seen in any parts of Canada, but added, "I would like to see more of the judges' more work and makes for greater keenness in the competition."

Harold Palmer of Kensington was the outstanding exhibitor here yesterday in the Guernsey classes at the Provincial Exhibition but Guy Rodd of Brackley might well be described as the outstanding breeder at the show. Palmer won thirteen firsts, four seconds, as many thirds and had several other good placings. Rodd had three firsts and two seconds as he had only five animals entered.
