

**NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.**

CINCINNATI, June 24.

Mr. Peckham, of New York, announced that the New York delegation had received a second letter from Mr. Tilden, in which he renounced all claims for a nomination. A second ballot was taken, giving Hancock 311, Bayard, 113, Field 61, Thurman 59, Hendricks, 31, Randall 19, English 19, Tilden 61. The States immediately commenced to change their votes, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, Illinois, Iowa and many other States going over one after the other, amid general enthusiasm. At 12.30 Hancock had received 705 votes out of a possible 720 or 730.

English was nominated by acclamation for Vice-President. There is great enthusiasm, cheering and waving of banners. After the announcement of Hancock's nomination, John Kelly of New York, speaking for Tammany, took the platform and endorsed the nomination, saying it would unite the divided Democracy of New York, and promised to do all in his power for the success of the Democratic ticket.

Telegrams from various parts of the country declare the ticket to be most acceptable to the Democracy.

Tilden sent Telegrams to Hancock to-day congratulating him upon his nomination.

A multitude of other congratulatory despatches have been sent to Gen. H., who is at his headquarters, Governor's Island, New York harbor.

NEW YORK, June 24.

On the announcement of his nomination, General Hancock said, "Gentlemen, I thank you all for your good wishes and congratulations on my nomination. It is impossible at the present moment for me to say anything on this subject. It is a great surprise to me, and one I was entirely unprepared for. I can only thank my friends for this mark of distinction, and to the gentlemen of the press I can only add that the despatch I hold in my hand was a great surprise to me. I thank you all for your congratulations."

The General shook hands with many of his friends who came crowding into headquarters to express enthusiasm on the result of nomination at Cincinnati. On all sides the expression of joy at the result was unbounded.

LONDON, June 24.

In the Commons to-day, Gladstone, in replying to Sir Stafford Northcote, said he had no advice to give relative to Bradlaugh; as he had not yet consulted his colleague. Northcote moved that the House, having asserted its authority, order Bradlaugh's release.

Labouchere said Bradlaugh when released would reassert his legal right.

Gladstone took no part in the debate.

Northcote's motion was adopted unanimously and Bradlaugh was released.

**CONDENSED DESPACHES.**

Bullion in the Bank of England increased £638,000.

Four persons bathing at Baltimore on Wednesday were drowned.

It is said the French Senate will pass the amnesty bill by a big majority.

London papers discuss Bradlaugh's commitment at great length. The Standard's article severely attacks Gladstone for leaving Northcote to act as leader of the House, and characterizes Bradlaugh's conduct as an open defiance to the House.
