Stresses Challenge Facing Consumers Across Canada

The annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island branch of the Canadian Association of Consumers was held last evening at St. Peter's Church Hall, with Mrs. J.A. Lawson, president. The guest speaker C.B.E. of Montreal, National President of the association was introduced by Mrs. Lawson immediately after the business meeting. In her remarks Mrs. Vautelet, said that as the C.A.C. stands today it has done more, in a very brief time, to raise the status of women in the eyes of the men who sell the goods actually of the world of our husbands—than any other effort of women. She dealt briefly on the many improvements in the marketing of consumer articles that C.A.C. has brought about, things which go toward helping the buyer to spend the consumer dollar more wisely and well. By the efforts of the association, she said, are selling the first attempts in Canada to build a partnership between rural and urban interests and "He who sells" and "She who buys." It is the selling of adulterated goods in an important field—the economy field.

HOUSEHOLD ECONOMY

Mrs. Vautelet, said to the gathering, "You and I run our households, in doing this we run the basic life-try of the land." Going to market, rearing our children and we live, love, laugh and BUY, all within the eddies of the great, rushing world and economic events. As women we have often been told that only the inside of the home women have failed to raise their sights beyond the immediate household horizons, the effect on the management of our world is so slight in relation to the potential of our powers, as to make uncertain our hopes of a world protected. In creating C.A.C. the women of Canada have taken up a big challenge, we have undertaken a practical approach to the urgent job of building a new attitude for women and a new understanding of our affairs."

CONSUMER POWER

The speaker went on to say that today one of the longest distances to cover is the short distance across the counter, that between the buyer and the seller. Since the hand that spends the household dollar also rocks or steadies the economy of the land, it is vital that a vast army of women-consumers be in a position to know and manage the responsibilities toward our economy.

Warns Against Continued Tuberculosis Development

"In the war against tuberculosis we have achieved only an incomplete victory," Dr. G.J. Wherrett said yesterday in addressing the executive committee of the P.E. Island Tuberculosis League, the doctors of the Sanatorium and Department of Health officials. "T.B. patients are dying in fewer numbers but new cases, particularly among mature persons, continue to develop at an alarming rate." Dr. Wherrett continued, "While the deaths in Canada last year from tuberculosis had dropped to 382, more than 200 new cases a week were taken on for treatment, or to be exact, 9,607. This is more than all other diseases combined, including polio. 14,489 people are under treatment every day of the year, and the average time spent in hospital is one year."

Dr. Wherrett said that while reducing the number of young patients was gratifying, the need of improving the situation with regard to older persons was acute. Provision has already been made for chest examinations in many industrial centres it is believed that eventually all patients entering hospital at any age and for any illness will undergo X-ray for TB as a routine procedure. "In short," the doctor said, "parents have been doing a good job in doing their children to undergo X-ray but have been neglecting themselves."

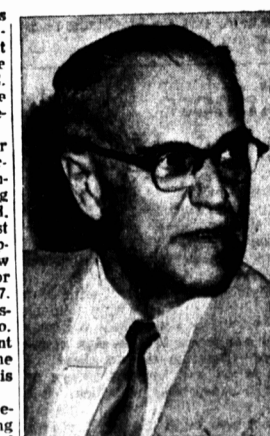
INADEQUATE FACILITIES

Mr. Cullen said that in Prince Edward Island there are no minerals and very few industrial plants. He noted that last year the Island had 100,000 visitors and predicted that the number would increase this year. "There is no reason why we could not have a million visitors a year but our transportation facilities will not handle them," he said.

In closing Mr. Cullen told the delegates of the proposed causeway connecting Prince Edward Island with the mainland. He said there was need for an additional ferry almost immediately and it was estimated the present annual deficit on the present ferries would amortize the cost of the causeway even though it were much higher in cost than the figure originally estimated. He asked that each director present from the other Provinces give it whatever support they could see fit.

D.A.R. Reveals Expansion Plans

KENTVILLE, N.S. (CP)—Manager J. C. McCuaig of the Dominion Atlantic Railway Tuesday announced a \$2,000,000 expansion program for this year. He said the parent Canadian Pacific Railway will spend the money on new equipment and tracks. The program includes diesel service for the nearby Windsor gypsum plant and for passenger services between Halifax and Yarmouth. About 8,000 feet of track will be laid at Miller's Creek and improvements will be made at the Hants county gypsum plant along with the new track at the Greenwood RCAF station.

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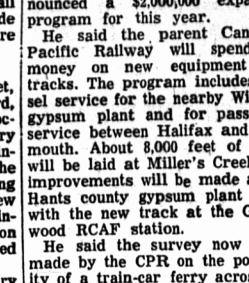

Message To Queen From Soviet President

LONDON (Reuters) — Soviet President Klementi Voroshilov told Queen Elizabeth in a message on her official birthday last Thursday that the Soviet leaders' talks with her and British ministers "marks an improvement of relations between the Soviet Union and the United Kingdom."

Moscow radio broadcast Voroshilov's greetings Tuesday. Premier Nikolai Bulganin and Nikita Khrushchev, the Communist party secretary, met the Queen during their British visit in late April.
