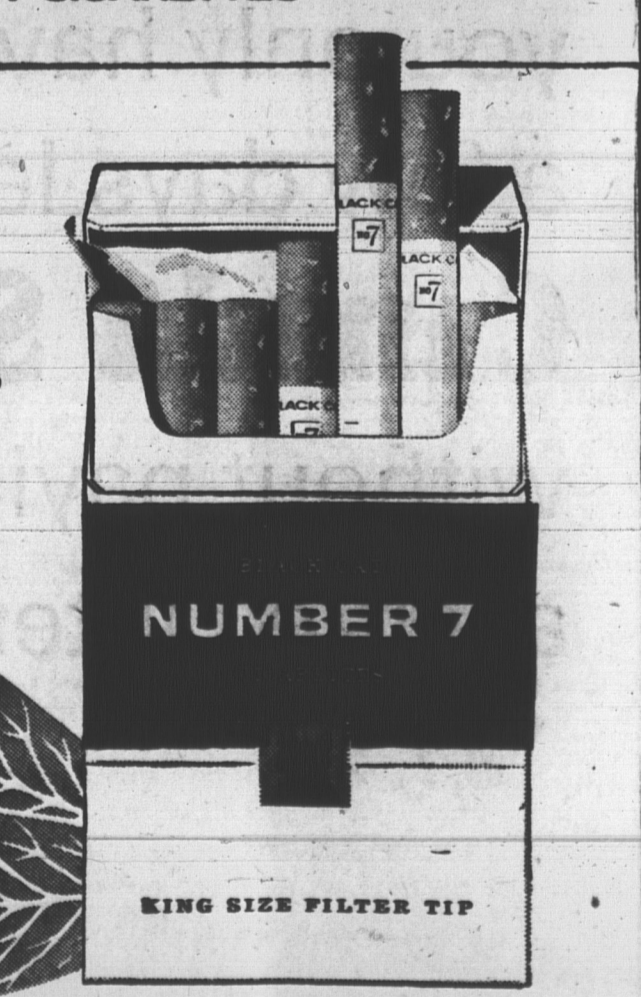
Chicago Overpowers Det.; Two Games End In Draw

College Hockey Starts Tonight

In quest of a second straight Maritime collegiate hockey championship, the St. Dunstons band of pucksters will hit the ice tonight in an exhibition tilt against the Prince of Wales Welshmen. This match will be more of an experimental one for each of the two clubs, and fans will probably see lines being juggled around considerably. However old rivalry between the two colleges should be more than obvious.

Jack Kane, mentor of the Saints has more than a few problems on his hands, and although the test this evening against the Welshmen will not be a true indication of the strength of his club (remember that PWC are playing in a junior league) he will be able to assess some of his club's weaker points.

Defenses should provide the Red and White with no problems for veterans Vince Mulligan, and Derrell Pollock will again be the first string defencemen and they both showed their steadiness in last season's games. The blue line contingent will be further bolstered by the presence of Art LeClair and Glen Hughes as well as one more member who has not yet been selected.

There has been some question as to whether Pollock will play this season but rumour has it that he will be donning the blades this evening.

Backing them up will be Carl McQuaid and netminding will be another of the Saints stronger points. As local fans will remember McQuaid was between the pipes for the Penguins when they travelled to Ottawa several seasons ago and he also was one of the reasons that the SDHS pucksters stood up so well in the Charlottetown Junior hockey league last year.

However the Saints offensive corps is the real question mark in most people's minds. His hand by graduations and transfers, the Red and White lost no less than six top notch forwards and among these six was spread 58 per cent of the Saints scoring attack. Gord Whitlock, Maurice Roy and Mike Kelly will be the only returning forwards and just whether Kane can manage to scrounge up enough new material to solidify his attack will be interesting to see. Two of the more promising prospects on the club are Charlottetown's Ron Gigey and Rick O'Donnell.

WELSHMEN STRONGER

The 1965-66 edition of the Welshmen look to be greatly improved! Coach Spy Ready took over the reins of the club midway through last season and under his guidance the PWC club has a good account of themselves in the playoffs. This year he has, in addition to last year's club, several welcome newcomers and this team appears on paper to be the one to beat in the Junior League. Jamie Kennedy, high scoring star for Rogers Rangers last season has donned the Welshman uniform and Ready also has Lincoln MacKenzie, star of the North River club, in harness. MacKenzie should be a welcome addition to the club for it has been defensive problems that have plagued the PWC aggregation in past years.

Ready's big question mark could prove to be in nets where he has not had steady performances in the past. However the club has no lack of scoring punch as can be evidenced by the scores of last season's games. Gus Houston, Joey Brown, Jean Paul Cyr, Jamie Kennedy and others all have that touch around the opposing teams net and if the Welshmen should be able to muster a steady defensive effort then there should be some terrific battles this season in the Junior hockey league.

RAMBLINGS

The question being posed is whether Jim Trimble, coach of Montreal Alouettes of the Eastern Football Conference, will still be around after today's meeting of the team's 10-man board of directors. Jungle Jim has just completed his third season with the Alouettes, three seasons in which he has not been able to bring the A's to the league's upper levels. His record has been 17 wins and 26 losses, nowhere near the level of the remarkable 61-28-2 record he compiled as seven-season coach of Hamilton Tiger-Cats. Joe Atwell, co-owner of the A's, hinted Trimble will be retained. "We'll look at our whole setup at the director's meeting. We've got a lot of sharp boys on the board. A switch in coaches would involve starting all over again, with a change in thinking which would take two or three years to implement." Trimble answers questions on the subject of his remaining with the A's with a short "no comment."

Gene Tunney, former world heavyweight champion, feels that professional boxing must be cleaned up or outlawed. Tunney, on a brief visit to West Berlin, said he favors the appointment of a federal boxing commissioner to "get the sport back to what it was in the early 1920s." He won the crown from Jack Dempsey Sept. 23, 1926. Tunney addressed a press conference at Tempelhof airport together with former champion Max Schmeling, now a businessman in Hamburg, West Germany. It was their first meeting in nearly 30 years. They never met in the ring.

SUMMERSIDE — Borden Mayor Gilbert Bell dropped the first puck to officially open the season for the Prince County Hockey League here last night, and the Borden Nationals took it from there to eat the Pope Motors Aces by a score of 8-5.

At attendance at the game were Summerside Mayor George Key Jr., Dr. Hillard Clark, 1st vice-president of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association, and Wing Commander Walker of ROCAF station Summerside.

It was a well-played game, extremely fast for the first game of the season, and for the most part a close, exciting contest till the 4:30 mark of the third period when Borden's Donnie MacWilliams, with the score reading 5-4 for the Nationals, scored the prettiest goal of the night, and pretty well sank the Aces' chances of coming back. Taking passes from A. Taylor and Jim MacLeod, MacWilliams came right in on Aces goalie Tim McGuigan, deked him to one side and slipped the puck behind him.

There was, surprisingly, no scoring in the fast-played first period, but the scorers came back with a vengeance to score seven goals in the second and five more in the third.

Ev White scored three goals for Borden, and Donnie MacWilliams and playing coach Jim MacLeod both scored two for the Nats. The Summerside goals were split among five players.

Armbro Flight Is Honored

WESTBURY, N.Y. (CP) — Canada's Armbro Flight won the \$81,386 Dexter Cup and seasoned trotter of the year honors in the United States with a fine three-length victory at Roosevelt Raceway Wednesday night.

Her time for the one-mile stake was 2:03 3/5. She had been favored in the betting, paying \$3, \$2.20 and \$2.20 a loss the board.

Second was Egyptian Cander, the colt that had beaten Armbro Flight in the Sept. 1 Hambletonian at Duquoin, Ill.

Owned by Eglin, Ted and Charles Armstrongs of Brampton, Ont., Armbro Flight's earnings were raised to \$211,050 with the Dexter victory.

Joe O'Brien, 48-year-old Alberton, P.E.I., native who trains and drives Armbro Flight, made arrangements after the race to fly the Canadian horse to Hollywood Park in California for the \$50,000-added American Trotting Classic Nov. 20.
