Cheese Payments.—There were paid last month, by Mr. D. Don, on last year's cheese account, \$ 4,549.88, and there are eight factories yet to be settled with.

Strawberry Festival.—Promenades concert and lots of fresh strawberries at the festival in the grounds of the Upper Methodist Church, Friday evening. A large crowd expected. The grounds will be beautifully trimmed by the committee in charge, and will be well worth seeing.

Congregation.—The handsome new Roman Catholic Church at Head St. Peter's Bay was consecrated on Tuesday by His Lordship Bishop Macdonald. Rev. E. B. Macdonald preached an able sermon leading the occasion, and the choir of St. Dunstan's Cathedral rendered Haydn's 15th Mass.

King's County.—On Tuesday evening Mr. A. C. Macdonald was formally declared elected as the representative of the riding of King's in the Dominion Parliament, his majority being 27. The total vote was Macdonald 1826, McIntyre 184. There were 144 rejected ballots. A recount was demanded, which is in progress to-day.

West Canadiana Eggs.—It is announced that the great egg importing house of Robinson & Sons, West Hartlepool, England, have decided to establish their Canadian branch in London. Mr. Robinson says that Canadian eggs have been found superior to Russian eggs, and his firm will handle the former in preference.

Medical Association.—The sixth annual meeting of the Maritime Medical Association will be held at Charlottetown, July 8th and 9th. The programme is inviting and the profession of P. E. Island are prepared to give a hearty reception to visitors from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. Several Montreal surgeons and physicians will be present.

Wholesale Foundry.—Peter Wheeler, who has been on trial at Kentville, N. S., for several days past for the murder of Annie Kempton, was on Tuesday evening found guilty and sentenced to be hanged on the 8th September next. Wheeler protests his innocence, and after sentence was passed told the Court he hoped that before the day of execution arrived the guilty person would be found out.

Fires in Newfoundland.—St. John's Nfld., despatch of the 30th June, says: Forest fires are sweeping over a northern portion of this island. On Friday twenty families were rendered homeless at Bonville. The extensive saw mill there was largely saved. On Saturday night Billie Island was swept by fire. The Methodist church, court house, Salvation Army barracks and 46 houses were destroyed. Mining property, including a magazine, containing a large quantity of dynamite and blasting powder, was saved with the greatest difficulty. Women and children are almost naked. They had to seek refuge in open boats in the harbor. The government is sending relief.

How the Birthday of Canada's Confederation was Observed.
