

# Civic Stadium Had Profit For Winter, Council Told

A net revenue of \$5,278.00 on the operation of the Summerside civic stadium during the fall and winter season was shown in a report dated April 13, presented last evening by Councillor W. E. MacCausland, chairman of the finance committee, at the regular meeting of the Summerside Town Council. Mayor W.A. Currie presided and all councillors were present.

The report showed that receipts for this period amounted to \$31,219.00. The rink canteen was credited with producing \$2,500.00 of the net surplus shown.

Councillor MacCausland also announced that the Council had decided to withhold a bond issue until September when it is hoped that the bond market conditions would be more favorable.

He said that the town assessors have completed about half of the 1957 assessments and expect to complete all of the work by June. Councillor Clark in reporting as chairman of the electric light department said that the kilowatt hours generated during the past month have been 20 per cent higher than they were two years ago.

He said that no decisions have been made regarding the purchase of a new engine which is needed at the plant, but said that when a recommendation is made he believed it would be for an engine which would burn kerosene. "C" oil which was more economical than the diesel fuel.

Councillor Clark reported on the installation of street lights in the town, with five or six having been installed in the area of Summerside East, and plans for street lighting in Summerside West.

**REQUEST SIDEWALK**

Councillor Leo Wood, chairman of the Street Committee, said he had a letter from property owners on Victoria Road requesting a sidewalk to be placed on the north side of the road. He introduced a resolution officially naming Beechwood Avenue — a new street north of Victoria Road and running East from Granville Street.

Councillor Clark inquired if any commitment by the town has been made regarding the paving of the North end of Central Street to the town limits.

Mayor Currie said that the council had not yet considered this matter.

Councillor Cannon inquired whether the town would have to assume the full cost of the sidewalk on Victoria Road and Town Manager Brophy said that the property owners would have to pay half of the cost of the sidewalk which would be 335 feet in length.

Councillor Elmer Newson, chairman of the committee in charge of schools and parks said that eight men are employed at present in clean-up work, etc., in the parks. He said that tenders would be called for the supplying of seedlings for landscaping work. He said that landscaping at the new auditorium had commenced, and would include the work of preparing the parking space in the area.

Town Manager Joe Brophy said that M.F. Schurman Co. had started work on the concrete walks at

the auditorium. He said that parking in front of the auditorium would be similar to the plan used at Prince County Hospital, and that about 30 cars would be able to park in this area, and additional parking areas being prepared on the side, the building would supply parking space to accommodate about 175 cars, it was hoped.

**REFERS TO COMPLAINTS**

Councillor Newson called attention to complaints in regard to a broken sewer in the west end, and the request of citizens in this area to have the pipes extended further into the harbor.

Councillor Edgar Cannon, chairman of the water and sewerage committee, replied that this unsatisfactory condition is known, and its cause in at least one case was due to the pipe having rusted out in some sections. He said that it would have to be repaired but at present there is no pipe on hand and Mayor Currie commented that every effort should be made to have the broken pipes repaired as soon as possible.

Referring to the water supply, Councillor Cannon said that some improvement has been noted, but that another well should be drilled, and then repairs should be undertaken on the other pumps and wells.

He said that it would be advisable to call tenders in the near future for the drilling of another well.

**POLICE DEPARTMENT**

Councillor Newson was critical of the Police Department, saying he had heard rumors of the police not attending to their duties.

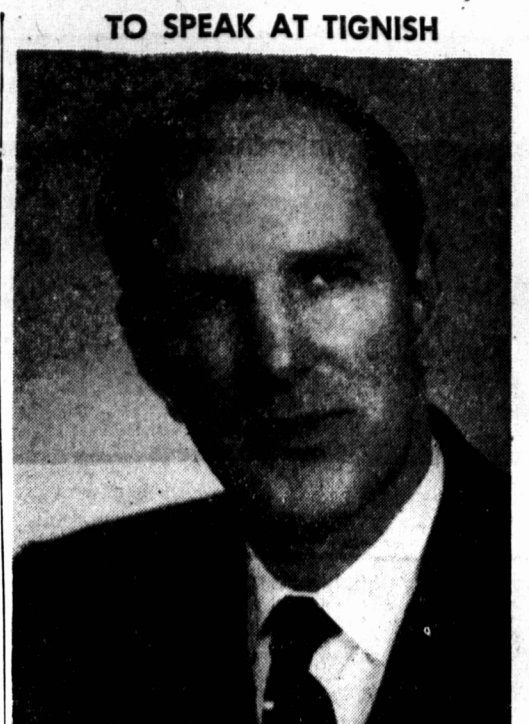
He said the police patrol should be used for police work only, and that one officer should be on Water Street at all times. He said that in a recent accident which he attended on Water Street it took 11 minutes to get a police officer to the scene. He said that speeders were using the streets of the town as a speed way, especially on Sunday.

Councillor W.E. Jenkins, chair-

man of the police committee, came to the defence of the Police Department, stating that the two-way radio in the police patrol was only operating intermittently at times because of mechanical difficulties. He said that the police found it difficult to be everywhere at the same time, and he felt they were trying to do a good job. Councillor Jenkins pointed out that the Police Department needed more men, but warned that this would also be an added expense.

In other matters of business dealt with by the council, John Carroll was engaged as sports supervisor for a period of 12 weeks at \$100.00 weekly to assist the Summerside Amateur Athletic Association with its athletic program for the coming summer months.

The council also authorized Mayor W.A. Currie to attend the 1957 convention of the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities at Murray Bay, Quebec. The Okto Club were given permission to hold a tag day, on Friday, May 31.

The many humorous situations which develop are most entertaining, and applause and laughter punctuates the play throughout. As the play draws to a close the Martins sisters become reconciled with their lovers, the Doctor agrees to marry her patient, the invalid sister who "enjoyed" poor health decides to get well, the detective taken on another case, the politician is asked to run for Congress, Susan decides to marry her constant Mike, and Olga removes the sign in case that her Swede might come to visit.
