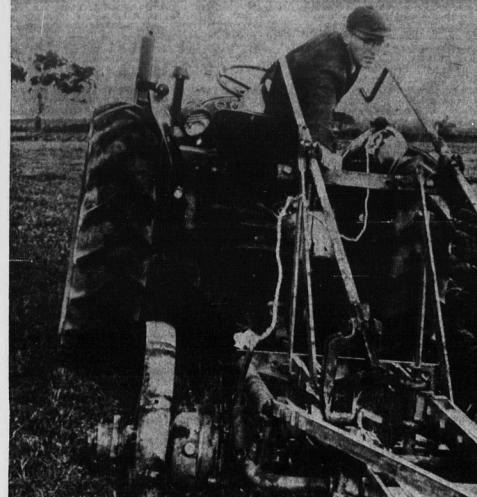

Russia, China Seen Close To Open Split

MOSCOW (Reuters)—The Soviet Union spokesman said that Communist China violated the Russian border at least 5,000 times last year as the Soviet-Chinese ideological quarrel heated the brink of rupture.

His reply to a Chinese statement of Sept. 1, Russia also attacked the Chinese for refusing to back the Moscow treaty test-ban treaty. It warned Communist China to expect a "decisive rebuff" if it continued "hostile activities" against Russia.

Separatist Demonstration Marks Concert Hall Debut

By ALEXANDER FARRELL, MONTREAL (CP)—After years of militant labor—and a few weeks of nervous apprehension, Montreal's \$33,000,000 Place des Arts concert hall opened its doors Saturday night.

Inside, a glittering first-night audience filled the 2,000-seat Grande Salle to hear the Montreal Symphony Orchestra in its debut concert.

Outside, a separatist demonstration resulted in some stone-throwing and 10 arrests for disturbing the peace.

Perfect peace reigned inside the elegant concert hall, where the gathered and tuxedo-clad audience, many of whom paid \$100 for their plush seats, enjoyed itself apparently unaware of the tumult in St. Catharines Street.

Many came early or stayed late to take a good look at the real star of opening night, the hall itself. Its lovers and loungers were piled up on the floor for an hour before the orchestra began tuning up and for an hour after the last note was struck.

In addition to providing a home for Montreal's young symphony orchestra and its hoped, it yet unborn opera company, Place des Arts is a sort of gallery of contemporary Canadian mural painting and sculpture.

Individual pieces raised some collective eyebrows but the total effect seemed pleasing.

In the piano lobby, the hall's main foyer, excited concertgoers applauded the shoulders of their supporters to a demonstration outside Montreal's Place des Arts at the official opening of the new cultural centre Saturday night.

Government Seen Needed To Justify 'Goons'

OTTAWA (CP)—Outright opposition to any deal for a non-sponsored trusteeship over maritime unions on the Great Lakes was voiced today by the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway, Transport and General Workers.

Government trusteeship over all five maritime unions in Canada is the only way to "get rid of Hal Banks and his high-priced goons in the Seafarers' International Union of Canada and to restore peace on the lakes, the union said in a 1,500-word statement.

The trusteeship statement, signed by President William J. Smith, Vice - President Elroy Robson and Secretary - Treasurer D. N. Second, threw cold water on new efforts to solve the problem by private union arrangement.

This proposal will be discussed in Washington next week at a top-level meeting of Labor Minister MacEachen U.S. Labor Secretary Wilbur J. Wirtz, President Claude Jodoin of the Canadian Labor Congress and Wirtz CIO President George Meany.

WIRTZ BACKS PLAN A private union - sponsored trusteeship has been strongly advocated by Mr. Wirtz as an alternative to the Canadian government's plan to introduce legislation for a government trusteeship after Parliament recesses Sept. 20.

The trusteeship statement said the only way to break up the "empire" under Banks is to appoint trustees with full authority to get rid of Banks, replace existing labor agreements, amend the union's constitution and bylaws, and introduce basic democratic methods of intervention.
