Jenkins Bros. Expand Cannery At Summerside

Jenkins Bros. Ltd., operators of a large cannery in Summerside, are expanding their business and are opening a poultry division. A two-story wooden building, 100 by 30 feet, has been erected across Noonan Street from their canning plant for this purpose.

They are now commencing to take in live poultry to kill and later on they plan to handle poultry feed. Mr. G. F. Cameron, secretary-treasurer of the company, explained that this new operation will supply the needs of their cannery which uses over a quarter of a million pounds a year. The remainder will be frozen, box packed and supplied to the Canadian and export markets.

Mr. Cameron said that in their canning plant only the bill of the hen is useless. The heads, feet and entrails are ground up for animal feed. It is then frozen in blocks and some is sold locally and the rest is shipped out of the province to animal feed manufacturers. The canning of beef will commence in the cannery today and on or about December 1st a switch will be made to chicken.

(Continued from page 1) certain direct price controls as a temporary measure to bring relief "from the present terrific high cost of living."

Private Members Speak - Three private members also participated in the debate. Douglas Harkness (PC-Calgary East) said there was no reason why many Canadian products should sell higher than a comparable product in the United States.

This was particularly true of motor cars. They had the benefit of labor production and obtained their major materials cheaper than American car producers. That being so, they should be able to undersell American cars. He suggested Canada's protective tariffs be re-examined.

Rev. Dan McIvor (LeFort-Wick) said he had found that the people now had more money to spend than ever before, though he conceded some sectors were suffering. Sports events and movies played to packed houses.

He wanted controls "but controls of the right kind." He felt the government should get after "those who want to make a killing."

Charlie Gillis (CCF-Cape Breton South) said he could not agree with observations made by Mr. St. Laurent about the operation of price controls in the United Kingdom.

While Mr. St. Laurent felt that the controls themselves were at fault in the U. K., Mr. Gillis said he personally felt that control

never would operate in a country, such as Britain, which had to import virtually everything that it used, and where high external prices were bound to upset calculations.

Prime Minister Speaks - Mr. St. Laurent reiterated the Government's view that price controls would not work at the moment. In the United Kingdom where they had both price controls and subsidies prices had risen more sharply from February to August than in either the United States or Canada.

"I think it would be wrong for us to try to put into effect measures that would turn out to be mistaken, and that we ourselves did not believe in when putting them before the public," he said. "That is something this government does not intend to do."

He expressed hope that there will be no further inflation. Recently many newspapers carried advertisements announcing reductions in prices, some of them inspired by the proposed anti-price fixing legislation.

Mr. St. Laurent said he had been told that inventories across the country are abnormally high and that they will not remain on the shelves even if some of them have to be disposed of at "diminishing returns."

(Continued from page 9) director has found from her visits to almost 300 classrooms to date that the Juniors are concentrating on the practising of the health rules, particularly on the care of the teeth.

The report also referred to the regular summer camp for children's clinics held each in August when 76 children reported for examination at Charlottetown and Summerside. Following these clinics several children were hospitalized for operations and plaster casts and recently five patients were sent to hospitals in Montreal where they are receiving treatment for hare-lip and cleft palates, cardiac and poliomyelitis conditions. Regular physiotherapy clinics were conducted twice weekly and 53 visits were made to the homes where parents made special instruction regarding their crippled children's training. These visits were made by the Director of Crippled Children's work and the Physiotherapist.

Lt. Col. L. P. Macdonald expressed satisfaction with the results of the ten-day visit of the mobile blood donor team to the province at the end of August when 1437 donations were received. As the result of these clinics the province has been able to provide its share of the blood and plasma required for the armed services overseas and to stockpile for civilian defence. He outlined plans for further clinics to be held during the first week of December.

Miss Kathryn MacLennan, chairman of the nursing committee stated that 123 articles of equipment were on loan from the provincial headquarters and Summerside branch sickroom supply cupboards. The material need still appears to be for wheel chairs, crutches and gatch-beds. Donations ranging from \$1.00 to \$25.00 were received from grateful individuals. Plans for the organization of classes in home care of the sick are now being made at provincial headquarters, at Souris and Summerside branches, and at Alberton and classes will get underway before the end of this month.

The report of the swimming and water safety committee showed that these classes received an all-time high during the past summer when 2,389 members were enrolled in 33 classes. Two instructors' schools held at different times during the summer qualified 20 instructors and trained three Life Guards for the national parks. Many life saving classes were also carried out and the candidates successfully passed the Royal Life Saving tests. This programme made it possible for many young people to receive an informal education during the holiday season which may some day save their own or someone else's lives.

Members of the Charlottetown Red Cross Corps continued to assist with the hospital visiting of veterans in the hospitals in the city, in the blood donor clinics and the making of dressings for use at these clinics, according to the report of Miss Dorothea Stewart, chairman.

In giving the report of the campaign committee, Major R. D. MacGillivray, in the absence of the chairman, Edwin C. Johnston, stressed the need of setting up the 1952 campaign committee in the very near future in order to assure that every district will have canvassers appointed. The campaign returns to date have not quite reached the \$25,000 mark which is some \$8,000 short of the objective.

Canadian Army Casualty List

OTTAWA, Oct. 15 (CP) - The army today released its 63rd casualty list of the Korean war, reporting four men killed in action: One officer and nine men wounded, and three men injured in action.

The list brought to 345 the number of casualties suffered by Canadian troops in Korean action, including 78 dead, 238 wounded, 28 injured in action, and one missing.

All those in today's list are members of the Royal Canadian Infantry Corps.
