Booklet By Textile Institute

Hits At Gov't Trade Policies

MONTREAL (CP) — The Canadian Textile Institute has released a booklet on the industry, which includes facts, figures and a whack at government trade policy.

The 16-page booklet mentions that 90 per cent of the entire Canadian output from more than 700 textile mills is sold in Canada, with 10 per cent going for export.

But "Canadian producers meet extremely stiff competition in the markets of the United States, Europe and Asia" when trying to sell their products there.

Of the total amount of textiles used by Canadians every year—875,000,000 yards of fabric—less than 60 per cent is supplied by Canadian mills.

"The domestic industry has long fought for every dollar of business. The mass-production and low-cost advantages that give foreign producers an edge in their own markets also give them an advantage on the Canadian market."

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accessible to imports of foreign textiles in the hope of assisting sales of Canadian resources products abroad."

Apart from trade policy, the booklet also tells of the growth of the textile industry in Canada in Ontario in 1929, the first mechanical mill in Quebec in 1827 and the incorporation of the Sherbrooke cotton factory in Quebec in 1945.

The industry today, with more than 87,000 employees, has an annual output of 1,000,000,000, the booklet says.

"Economists predict that the use of textiles in Canada will continue to increase steadily until at least 1970. Providing there are no revolutionary changes in production methods, to fill the increased demand will require a

total labor force of textile workers of approximately 130,000 persons.

IS HOPEFUL
"What part of these are Canadians and what part are foreign workers will, of course, depend on how the Canadian market for textiles is divided at that time. The Canadian industry is hopeful."

The booklet adds that each job within the industry provides employment to an additional 1.2 persons for supplies, services, repairs, maintenance and so on.

"Eighty per cent of the owners of the industry in Canada are Canadians, the booklet says. "An important consideration when it is realized that any mature nation must have its own reliable source of textiles."
