Pasteript to a letter from Sydney, dated 29th ult. :— "We have had a fearful gale here from the N. E., lasting from Saturday night up to last night. It is blowing pretty stiff just now from the northward. We hear of a large ship ashore at Cow Bay; she was seen off Bridgeport on Tuesday, dismasted; she afterwards struck on Flint Island; got off and drifted into Cow Bay. She is supposed to be 1000 or 1200 tons, loaded, probably from Quebec. No particulars yet. We expect bad news from the fishing establishments to the northward."

AWFUL TRAGEDY.—An event most tragical and painful took place at Kennetook on Thursday morning, the 20th inst. A Mr. John McDonald, a young man who it appears had been for some time previously in mental distress, became insane on Wednesday. On Thursday morning, standing at the door where another young man, Mr. McCulloch, was cutting wood, he asked for the axe to chop. At first McCulloch refused, but at the advice of the father and brother of McDonald he gave him the axe, and retreated back a step or two. As he was turning to go away McDonald rushed at him and struck him a blow above the thigh joint, sinking the axe in as far as it would go. Immediately after he fell, he struck him another such blow on the thigh, when he was seized and the axe taken from him. While those who were present turned their attention to McCulloch, supposing him to be killed, McDonald escaped. Search having been made for him he was discovered a short distance from the house hanged upon a tree quite dead. The event has thrown a gloom over the settlement. The recovery of McCulloch is doubtful. The parents of McDonald are both far advanced in years, and are entitled to the sympathy of our neighbors.

The Ship *Arca*, of Windsor, N. S., from Liverpool, for Bucksport, with a cargo of salt, was on shore near Castine. She was got off by the steam-tug *Nautilus*, and towed into Castine. She is apparently little injured.—Bangor Cour.

BRITISH COLUMBIA.—Dates from Victoria, V. I., are to 8th September, and from the diggings on Fraser's River to Sep. 9th. The mining news is considered cheering. The river has fallen four feet within a week, and continued to fall at the rate of from six to eight inches per day. A miner at Fountain Diggings had taken out £900 in fifteen days. Two men on Santa Clara Bar took out £80 per day. A good deal of gold dust was being offered for sale at Fort Hope and Yale, at £16 per ounce. "Dry Diggings" had undoubtedly been discovered near Fort Yale. John D. Galbraith, late a member of the California Legislature, and known to be a man of integrity, declares that he has found diggings on the banks of a creek emptying into Fraser's River near Fort Yale, which yield as high as eight or ten cents to the pan. His statement is corroborated by others. No new Indian difficulties had occurred. The savages seem inclined to observe the treaty lately entered into. Work on the Harrison and Lillooet Trail had been resumed, and it was thought that this trail would be finished and opened to public travel within ten days. The "Whatecom Trail" is also said to be completed, but as yet has not attracted much travel. This latter trail leads from Whatecom to the Thompson River.

The steamer *Sea Bird*, owned by Captain J. T. Wright, of San Francisco, was burned on her way from Victoria to Fort Langley on the 7th September. She was discovered to be on fire, when about sixteen miles out from Victoria, and was immediately beached on Discover Island. The boat and cargo were a total loss. The cargo was valued at \$50,000. The boat was insured for as much as she was worth. No lives lost.

SALE OF SHIPS, YESTERDAY.—Yesterday, four vessels were offered for sale by public auction, at the office of Messrs. A. Mann & Co., a minority brokers, York buildings; and the result may be regarded as showing the depressed state of the shipping interest at present. The first offered was the fine screw steamer *Francois Arago*, of about 1,800 tons, old measurement, which was built at Nantes in 1855, and was favorably known in the transport service during the late war. The ship *Prince of the seas*, 1,326 tons register, was next put up. She was built in 1853 at St. John, N. B., by the builders of the *Mercator*, and was described as having accommodation for 450 passengers. She was put up at £5,000 and advanced to £6,000, when the bidders stopped, and she was bought in at the reserved price of £7,500. For a ship, the *Time and Truth*, of 576 tons register now lying in the Salt-house Dock, not a single bid was made. The new brig *Dashing Wave* was next offered. £1,100 was bid for her, but she was bought in for the owner at the reserved price of £1,700.—London S. & M. Gazette, Oct. 9.

TIMBER TRADE.

(From *Farnworth's & Jardine's Timber Circular*.) LIVERPOOL, 7th October, 1858.—We have had free arrivals both of Timber and Deals during the past fortnight; shippers apparently operate quite regardless of consequences, for present and late arrivals have been in face of prices that show a very considerable loss. There has been rather a better demand from consumers of late, but not yet sufficient to make an impression on stocks, and as the demand is freely met by importers and holders, there is no advance in prices. **Pine Timber.—Quebec Pine.**—The import for the fortnight has been 7337 logs. The only sale that has transpired is cargo per "Dorothea" by auction, 60 feet average, at 13½d. per foot. Most of the late arrivals are still in the river and unsold. **Saint John Pine.**—One cargo has been sold on private terms, and by auction the cargo per "Alexander," averaging 18½ inch string, viz:—On 24th ult., 425 logs at 22d., 75 logs at 22½d., 50 logs at 22½d., and on the 1st instant 100 logs at 21d., and 478 logs at 21½d., per foot. **Miramichi Pine** has been sold at 12½ to 13d. per foot.

**Hardwood.**—By auction St. John of 16 to 16½ inches has averaged 20d. to 21½d. per foot; Prince Edward Island sold at 14½d. per foot.

**Spruce Spars** have been sold at 14d. to 15d. per foot. **Spruce and Pine Deals.**—The import for the fortnight consists of 233,338 pieces; consumption is improving gradually, but as long as the import continues so much in excess of the demand an advance in value cannot be realised. Cargoes continue to be sold ex ship on arrival, but few prices transpire.

**Lathwood** is in fair request at 40s. to 60s. per fathom for common, and 80s. to 90s. for good Hemlock.

**Palings and Laths** have been sold at 55s. per M for the former, and 20s. per M for the latter.

**A. F. & D. Mackay's Timber Circular, Sept. 24.**

REMARKS.—Since our last issue we cannot report any decided improvement in the general state of commercial matters. The long promised and anxiously expected revival in trade seems still to be as distant as it appeared to be six months ago. In nearly every branch of business there is reported a superabundance of stock, which, instead of being taken up by a consumptive demand, has at present an undecidable tendency to increase. If this be true, as unfortunately it is only too true, in respect to general business, it is much

more so as regards the trade in Wood. The imports, although considerably less than those of last year, are nevertheless greatly in excess of the immediate demand; and the lowness of price caused by the condition of matters is aggravated by the continued efforts made to press sales by auction upon an already glutted market.

**PINE TIMBER.**—Of this article the arrivals have not been large in absolute quantity, although they considerably exceed the required amount, judged by the extent of sales, and become in a much greater degree excessive when measured by the prices which are obtained for even the best qualities. The cargo from Quebec, ex Captain Cook, of excellent quality and 83 feet average, was run off in lots by auction at an even rate of 16d. per foot. Another cargo, ex Minnesota, of ordinary quality and 63 feet average, was also disposed of in a similar manner, at 13d. per foot. Other cargoes of good and indifferent qualities were sold by private treaty, the prices of which have not transpired. From St. John the import has been moderate, and if it does not come in large quantities will meet with sales at fair rates, particularly if the quality be fine.

**HARDWOOD.**—Of this a large parcel from Prince Edward Island sold at 14½d. per foot from the quay. One or two parcels from St. John, now in course of being landed, are advertised for sale by auction this day.

**N. B. AND N. S. PINE AND SPRUCE DEALS** have of late been forced upon the market by auction, at prices which must prove seriously detrimental to the interests of importers. The prices for St. John Spruce have ranged from £6 17s. 6d. to £7 5s. by the cargo, at auction, in small lots. Of St. Andrew's, a cargo sold in a similar manner, at £6 15s. 6d.

The Australian papers state on reliable authority, that Mr. Charles Dickens contemplates an early visit to Victoria, with a view to making a tour of the gold fields, and acquainting himself, by personal observation, with the phases of society in Victoria.

The Times strongly advises the purchase of the Great Eastern for the Royal Navy, to be used as a floating ram, observing that ten years hence when the ship is no longer saleable, Parliament will be asked for a million of money to build such a vessel from the keel, and it will cost two millions to do so.

The King of Sardinia has sent an invitation to the Emperor and Empress of the French to visit him at Turin in the spring.

**MARINE DISASTER.**—New York, Oct. 21.—The American clipper ship *Phantom*, Capt. Quig, from Richmond for Pernambuco, was captured in a squall about the 22d ult., in lat. 38 north, lon. 45 west. The masts were cut away and the vessel righted, but with her hold full of water. The hatches burst and she became a complete wreck. After five days exposure the crew were saved by the Spanish brig *Tolo*, and reached Havana on the 11th inst.

The *Daring* brought up Capt. Pike, crew and materials of brig *Lark*, of and from St. John for P. E. I., wrecked on Sable Island, on the night of the 26th ult., during a heavy N. E. gale. The vessel has since gone to pieces. On morning of 30th ult. a vessel on fire was seen off the south side of the Island, and about noon a large steamer came from the eastward, went to the wreck and remained by it for about two hours, and then proceeded to the eastward at full speed. The day was very fine and the sea quite smooth. After the steamer left, nothing could be seen of the burning vessel.

On the 20th of May, 1854, Catherine E. Pichie attempted to leave the cars of the Hudson-River Railroad at Trivoli, when they started and she was thrown down, and the cars passed over one of her feet, crushing it so that it had to be amputated. Her father recovered of the company \$750 in a suit for loss of service and medical attendance, and now the young lady has obtained a verdict for \$5500 damages from the company.

**CRIME AND ITS RESULTS.**—On Friday last, Lia Stout, who helped to kill his brother-in-law, was hanged at Rochester, N. Y. On the same day, Mrs. Twigg was executed at Danville, Pennsylvania, for the murder of her husband. Clark, her paramour, was executed some time since. She protested her innocence on the scaffold, and asserted her readiness to die, saying the only regrets she had were that she left behind her two orphan children. At Portland, on Friday last, John A. Holmes, late master of the ship *Theresa*, was convicted of the murder of George W. Chadwick, one of his crew, under the most revolting circumstances.
