Russia Has Highly Developed Banking System, Seen By President Of Royal Bank

Russian banking, an efficient modern system - full automatized, housing its workers in fine up-to-date offices and employing large numbers of women, has impressed Mr. James Muir, Scots born president of the Royal Bank of Canada who has just returned from a fortnight's visit to the Soviet Union.

Mr. Muir, who visited Russia at the invitation of the chairman of the State Bank of Russia, was shown "in as detailed and as painstaking a manner as one could wish, the intricacies of the Soviet banking system."

Mr. Muir said in Edinburgh that he had met no political figures during his visit but had just "talked banking with his hosts and had answered their questions on the Canadian banking system."

Mr. Muir said that the Russians economic system could not function without banking. "Money and credit is one of the main processes of the system."

PLANNING

The State Bank, he added, "a vital agent which carries out the Governments planning policies," was roughly equivalent to Central and Commercial banks in Britain and Canada. It controlled the issue of currency and credit and gave money to various industries.

Of the Russian banks themselves, Mr. Muir stressed the fact that more and more automatic devices - all of them Russian made - were being employed by bankers and the aim was to introduce automation as fully as possible.

Mr. Muir said that in view of the controversy about premium bonds being introduced in Britain it was interesting to discover that Russians had been issuing them for many years. "These bonds are non-saleable between individuals. They are just lottery bonds with drawings twice a year." There were also lotteries for current accounts.

Current accounts, said Mr. Muir, carried no interest but savings still presented many attractions for the Russians. They could save for holidays, consumer goods and, if they were in the better paid class, they might possibly buy a small house in the country. The government, however, also sold the public 3 1/2 per cent bonds but there was no interest on lottery bonds, nor were they saleable but were redeemable only on maturity.

Mr. Muir emphasized that the profit motive in the workings of Russian banks was very much in evidence. "They must conduct their business at a profit and they must employ extensive cost-accounting machinery all the time relative to the different lines of endeavour. It was from the profit that the services of the Government and the expansion of industry took place.

Women, said Mr. Muir, were employed in great numbers by Russian banks. They were good workers and often reached very high positions. The conditions of bank employees in the Soviet Union, he said, seemed good and the offices were generally up-to-date. One of the surprising features of banking was the amount of piece-

work carried out by many of the employees. They were paid for the amount of work they got through.

Mr. Muir said that during his visit he had inspected banks in Moscow and Leningrad and had also toured Prague. "I was given the greatest amount of freedom to walk about the streets and talk to people, he said. "I was impressed by the amount of hard work carried out by the people - especially the women - who were all obviously striving to better their standard of living."

A great deal of work, he said, was being carried out on restoring ancient monuments of the various cities and there were large areas of condemned houses being pulled down in places like Moscow to make way for new housing schemes.
