OPPOSE AFFILIATION
WINNIPEG (CP) — The Manitoba Federation of Labor has gone on record against affiliation with any political party. In the same resolution, the convention approved "the formation of a new political movement." The executive was instructed to take necessary action to assist in the formation of a new political party in Manitoba, including meetings with the Manitoba CCF, the Manitoba Farmer's Union and other interested organizations.

Parole Can Work Out With Amazing Success

CALGARY (CP) — Parole can work with amazing success in the reform even of murderers, drug addicts and habitual criminals, national parole board chairman T. George Street said Wednesday night.

In a speech to the John Howard Society of Alberta he said people who are cynical about parole of convicts should read some of the board's files and "learn of some of the phenomenal successes there have been in converting what seemed to be hardened criminals to useful, productive and respected citizens."

"There are two murderers who were trained as hospital attendants and now are working in this capacity outside prison, and many others convicted of murder who now are respectable citizens."

One man sentenced for armed robbery had shown a desire in prison to reform, had been granted a parole and became a uniformed security officer "which means he now is in effect a policeman."

"During the last four years, 10 men who had been sentenced as habitual criminals have been released, and of these only two were returned to the institution."

NOT NAIVE

Mr. Street, a former Ontario magistrate, added however that he is not naive enough to think that of all the convicts released on parole none will get into trouble or commit another crime.

"There are bound to be some that do if there weren't then we are not being positive enough in our approach to this problem."

His statements were included in a text of his speech issued to the press before delivery.

Mr. Street said there often comes a time in a prisoner's life "when he realizes the utter stupidity and futility of his past actions."

"If he could be released at this stage, he would probably go straight and make good. If he isn't released at this stage, then he may be overcome with hopelessness and bitterness and become lost."

Nfld. Families Plan To Move

TORONTO (CP) — The International Woodworkers of America (IWA) is preparing to move about 100 families of IWA loggers from Newfoundland to the mainland to escape a blacklist they say is barring them from working in logging and other industries.

H. Landon Ladd, Eastern Canadian director of IWA, said his union will join with others in an effort to find jobs for the relocated loggers.

Anglo-Newfoundland Development Company refused to re-employ the loggers after the IWA's strike earlier this year. Legislation framed by Premier Joseph Smallwood wiped out the IWA's certification as bargaining agent for Newfoundland loggers.

A rival organization, the Newfoundland Brotherhood of Woodworkers, was promoted by the companies as bargaining agent for the loggers.

Mr. Ladd Friday told the third annual convention of the IWA's eastern district that the union is going underground in its continuing struggle on the island.

"It is a disgrace to all of Canada that workers must revert to the tactics of an early, cruel era to resist a cynical combination of state power and wealth," he said.

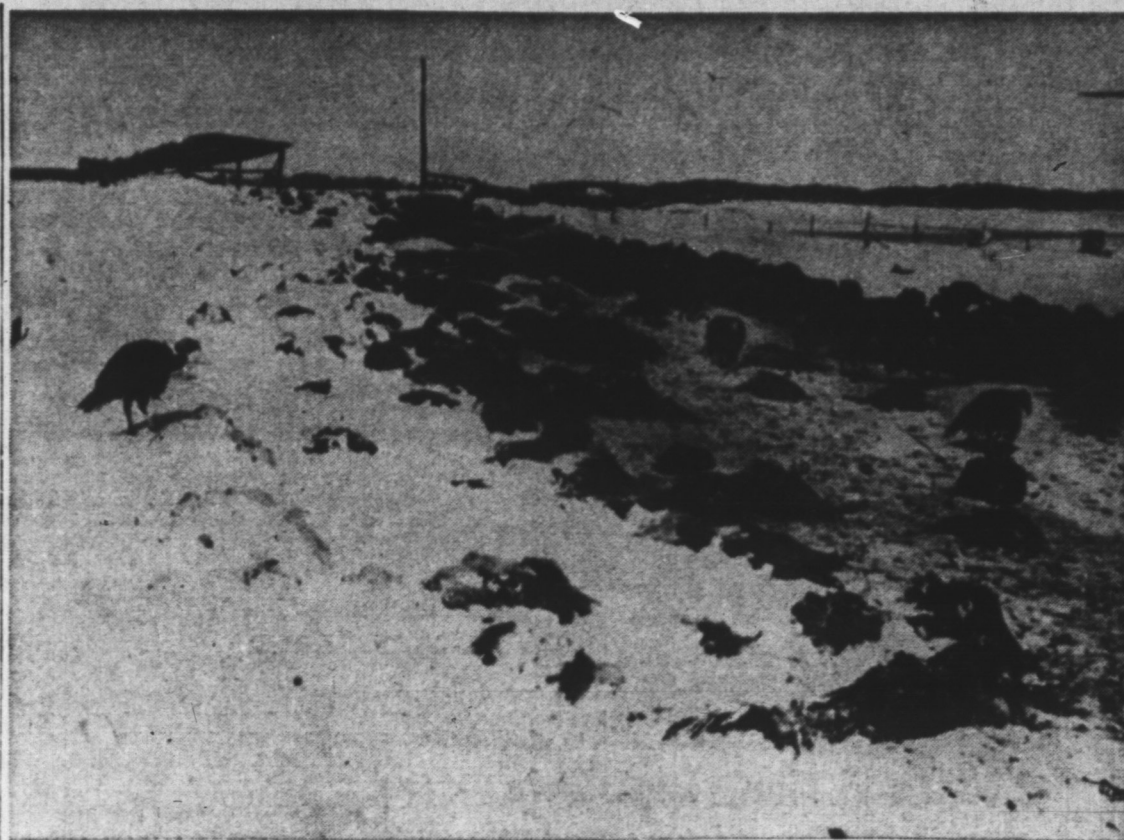

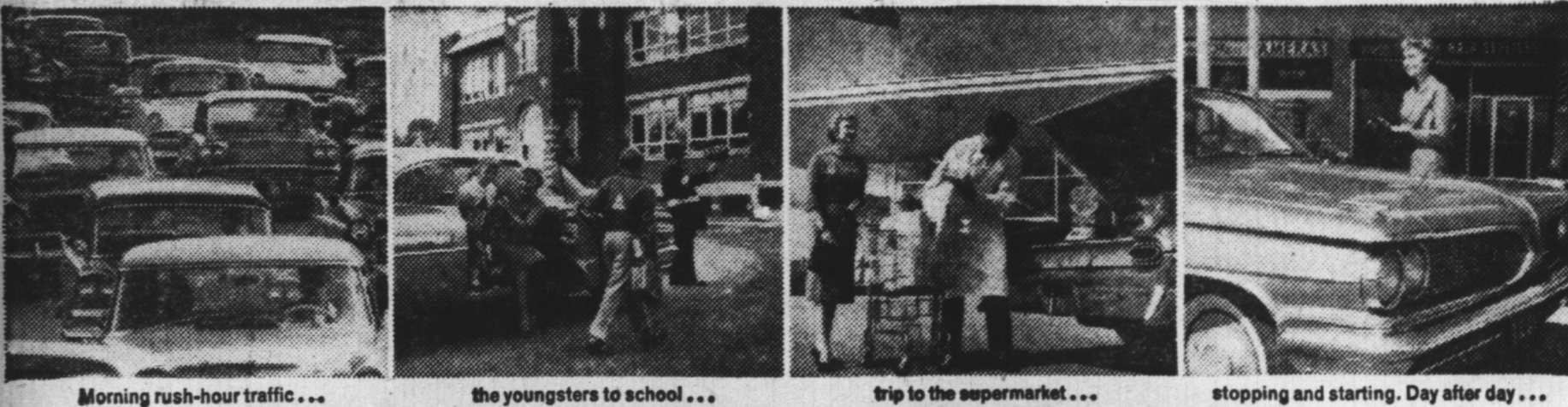
Donald O'Brien, who was married a few months ago, is building a new home on his father's property. He hopes to have it ready for living in this winter with the help of his father and brother.

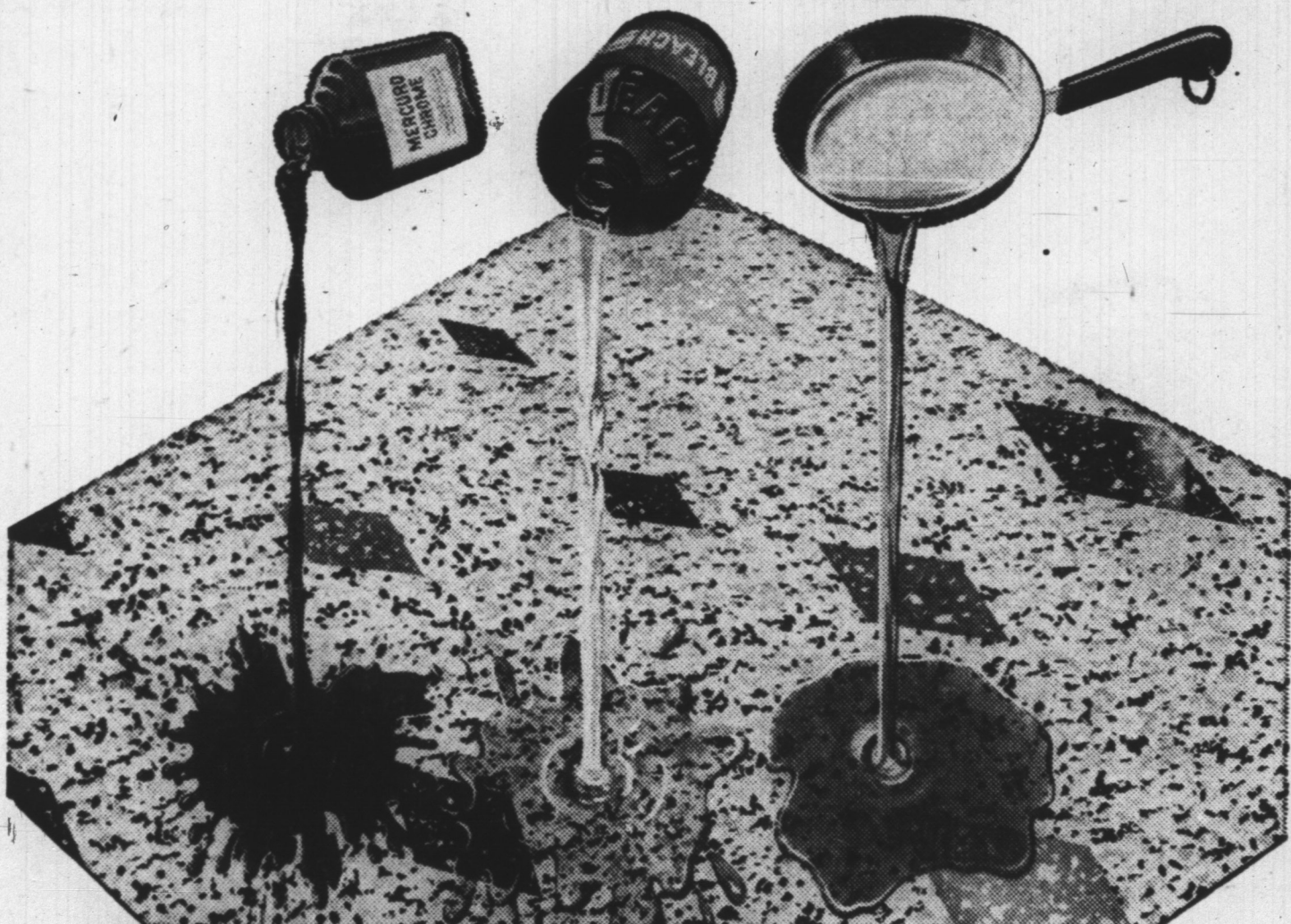
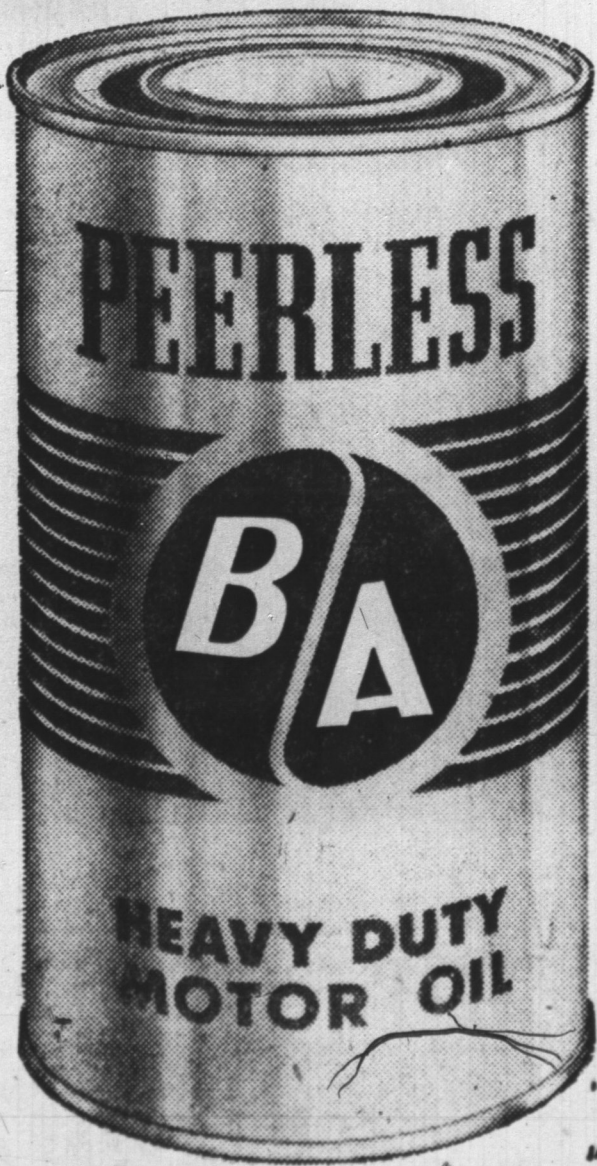
