Chas. E. Leforgey, sailed yesterday after-  
noon for Buenos Ayres. She had two

A SING SING.—It is pleasing to hear that  
the recent recital under the direction of  
Miss Macmillan was a success from a  
financial as well as an artistic standpoint.  
The gross receipts amount to \$129.50, and  
after the expenses are taken out Miss  
Macmillan will be able to hand over the  
handsome sum of \$100 to the hospital fund.

KENSINGTON FACTORY.—It is pleasing to  
hear that the output of the cheese factory  
at Kensington during the season which is  
now about closing has been 2661 boxes,  
the largest in its history. The building  
has been enlarged during the season, and  
a complete butter making plant has been  
put in. The milk supply is about 2,500  
lbs a week.

FIRE IN MONCTON.—A fire in Moncton  
yesterday morning caused a loss of about  
\$40,000, with insurance amounting to  
\$23,000. E. P. Reid's wholesale grocery,  
and the Central Bookstore were wiped out  
of existence. Rudlick's block adjoining  
was totally destroyed. G. A. Vve's build-  
ing was partially burned and badly gutted.  
J. B. Morris' barber shop, Connor's  
restaurant, and Mrs. Dobson's dress-mak-  
ing establishment also suffered. This, in  
brief, is the story of the fire. It started  
in the Central Bookstore, but its origin is  
a mystery.

THE BLOODY MEADOW.  
Tewkesbury, where a famous battle  
was fought during the war of the

180 miles from London. The battle was

side the modern town, and, according to  
local tradition, one night in every  
year on the anniversary of the conflict
