Let's Talk It Over

We heard an educator make a
rather startling statement once. He
said: "If you taught the pupils
of the elementary grades English,
and nothing else under the sun,
you might be surprised at how
well equipped they were to cope
with all the subjects on the high
school curriculum."

To neglect everything else for
English would perhaps be rather
extreme, but there is, nevertheless,
a certain amount of sound reason-
ing behind the suggestion. There
is little question that an alarm-
ingly large percentage of pupils
enter high school poorly equipped
in fundamental English construc-
tions. Certainly this poor ground-
ing in English, which is so wide-
spread, is a formidable handicap,
preventing pupils from under-
standing properly, and expressing
properly the subject matter of the
high school grades.

We sincerely believe it would be
a step in the right direction to go
part way with this educator's idea,
radical though it seems to be.
Primary pupils could not safely
ignore the science of numbers,
which is called arithmetic in the
earlier school years. But 25% of
the time could be devoted to
arithmetic, and 75% to English,
the students gaining information
from these studies more or less
casually, but not being required
to pass examinations in them.
Much the same thing is done now
with such school subjects as music,
physical drill, etc.

This plan would put the stress
directly on English where it un-
doubtedly belongs. It would allow
time for exhaustive drill in English
fundamentals, and this drill could
help produce pupils much better
grounded in English, and, as a
consequence, much better equipped
to handle other subjects which are
necessary to a well-rounded educa-
tion.

By Chinese Reds

HONG KONG (AP)—A 44-year-
old China-born American business
man, lame and near-sighted from
three years in a Shanghai jail and
said other Americans still were
held there. He didn't know how
many.

There have been reports of as
many as 30 Americans and 10 Can-
adians still held in Red China.
Arnold Klein told reporters he
was released without explanation
last Monday from Shanghai's
Wardroad jail and given seven
days to get out of Red China.
He said death and suffering were
rampant in the jail; that prisoners
died at the rate of 15 a day dur-
ing one winter; and that Red
fighting squads are bringing in
Chinese at the rate of six to eight a
day and shooting them.
