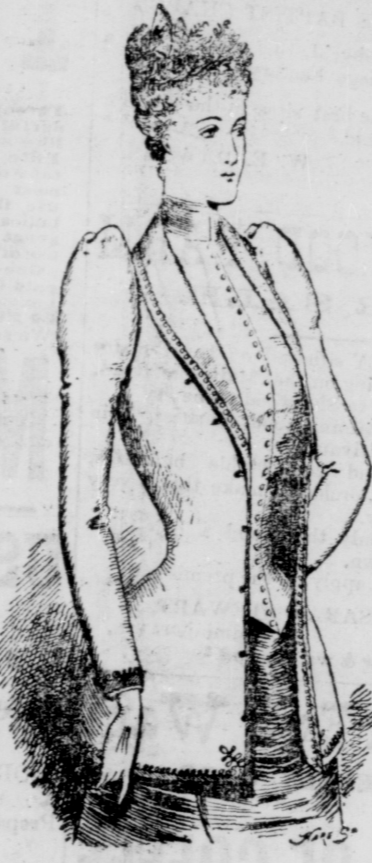

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. TRAGIC OCCURRENCE! Chinese Rule and Moham- medan Justice. SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 3. Details have been received here of a tragic occurrence in the northern province of China—the region of Tulufan. In this region are numerous Mohammedans. These people are powerful, as well as numerous in the community, but are perfectly ignorant of the principles of trade. A native had for years conducted a sort of a banking house at Hupoo. He had accumulated an immense fortune, making large sums by lending money at usurious rates. Unfortunately for him, at the wrong time he pressed his creditors, who were all Mohammedans with too much severity. They held a mass meeting and threatened him. This had no effect, and finally a few weeks ago they armed themselves, seized him and put him to death in the most brutal manner. With him the mob killed no less than thirty-eight Chinese who were his followers and friends. The heads of the victims were afterward placed on bamboo poles and exposed to view. A revolt was imminent but was stopped by the Mohammedan chiefs.

HALIFAX, Oct. 3. In the Maritime sports yesterday, the 100 yards race was won by Bowen, of the Wanderers; the pole vault was won by N. Murphy of Antigonish, who cleared nine feet; the 220 yards by Bowen; the half mile by McIntosh, of the Wanderers; putting the shot by Murphy, 36 feet, 43 inches; three mile walk, by Stockwell; the one mile by McIntosh; the high jump by Ruggles, of the Wanderers; the 440 yards by Bowen; the 120 yards, Hurdles, by Henry.

AMHERST, Oct. 3. Oxford and River Philip districts have been stirred by a mild sensation. An I. C. R. official won the heart of a prepossessing lady about sixteen years old, residing at Nappan. HALIFAX, Oct. 3. At the meeting of the Maritima Synod last evening, Mr. T. C. James, of Charlottetown, made a strong plea on behalf of the employment of laymen in the Church. He thought the Presbyterians were too conservative in this respect.

HALIFAX, Oct. 3. The losses by Thursday night's fire will not exceed a quarter of a million of dollars. The insurance amounts to \$130,000.

POLICE COURT.

This morning, a man for being drunk and fighting on lower Queen Street yesterday afternoon was fined \$50 or 30 days, and another young man for being drunk and swearing on the streets was disposed of for a similar fine. A young woman named Maggie Mahar, was given four months hard labor for obtaining a pair of boots from J. H. Bell, shoemaker, on a forged order. It appears that Maggie, who was in the employ of Mrs. E. Burris, as a domestic, applied to Mr. Bell for a pair of boots. Bell said he would let her have the boots if she got an order from Mrs. Burris. Yesterday afternoon she appeared at Bell's shop with a name for the boots, to which Mrs. Burris' name was attached. She got the boots and left the premises. Subsequently, Mr Bell discovered that the order was a forgery, and swore out a warrant for the arrest of the girl. She was arrested by Marshal Cameron, and was wearing the boots when taken in custody. In Court this morning she admitted forging the order, and pleaded as an excuse that she had been told to do it by two young men—admirers of theirs. His Honor did not take much stock in the story. Maggie said she would be sixteen years old on the 1st March next.
