

Local and Other Items.

GUELPH and Ottawa are the applicants for the Provincial Exhibition in 1883. SHARP frosts have visited Manitoba. Fortunately the crops have been garnered. The mineral exhibits from Nova Scotia form a leading attraction at the Dominion exhibition Kingston. A MAN named Cassin Deslaurier has been arrested in Ottawa owing to the death of his wife under suspicious circumstances. PICTOU ACADEMY has 123 students, of whom 18 are not residents of the country; 12 are preparing for matriculation at Dalhousie. HALIFAX, N. S., garrison will be reduced to one regiment of the line, three batteries of artillery, and a company of engineers. SIR RICHARD is crushed again. The party organ in London has stated that there is not in Ontario an abler man than Mr. Hardy. MR. KEELY, the inventor of the motor, has bound himself to run a train from New York to Chicago at a cost for fuel of fifty cents. LOWELL Criticism—"Out West a man is considered nobody unless he has 'killed his man.' There is where young physicians have the advantage over the average man in migrating West. A SYNDICATE of rich New York railroad men have a corner in September corn on the Chicago market to the extent of four million bush. The Price is expected to advance to 75 cents before October 1st. Of 300 colonization companies that were started within the past twelve months only seventeen have fulfilled the terms imposed by the government. The remainder have forfeited their allotments of land, which revert to the crown. The completion of the iron bridge of the Atlantic and Pacific Railway over the cañon Diablo, in Arizona, adds another to the list of high bridges. It spans a dark, gloomy gorge some 250 feet deep. The bridge is 249 feet above the water, 541 feet long, weighs 837,130 pounds, and cost \$200,000. An attempt is being made in Montreal to compel Druggists to take out liquor licenses for the sale of medicated wines, and for this purpose suits have been entered against two members of the Pharmaceutical Association. It is expected that another fight over a constitutional question will thus arise. At St. John some houses are being torn down to make room for new freight sheds. One tenant refuses to leave though the roof has been taken off, and all the house, but his room, torn down. The contractor proposes to move the balance of the house across the street and try to freeze the man out. ON Thursday last, while the Boston and Colonial Company's steamer "Carroll," Capt. Brown, was proceeding through the Strait of Canso, she ran foul of the schooner "Excel," of Charlottetown, carrying away the latter's jib boom and doing other injury. The "Excel" is a vessel of 52 tons register and is owned by D. R. Dewar, of Montague, P. E. Island.—Halifax Herald. SPECIAL attention is directed to the advertisement of the "Life Association of Canada." It has a guaranteed capital of \$200,000, a reserve fund of \$141,000, and has deposited with the Dominion Government, \$161,000. Its Board of Directors is composed of the leading business men of Ontario, and the honorary Board of Directors for this city are well known. We predict for the Life Association a good business in P. E. Island. The Schooner "Hara" Captain Boulanger, of and from Gaspe for Halifax laden with fish is reported to have been abandoned off P. E. Island. She left Gaspe on the 12th inst., and is supposed to have sprung a leak in the gale of Saturday last. The crew were picked up and taken to Paspic. The vessel was owned in Gaspe and the cargo, which was owned by Mr. A. C. Creighton, of this city, was insured in Halifax Offices for its full value.—Herald. A MAN was recently sentenced to a months imprisonment with hard labor for having had tobacco-pipes, matches and nails in his possession in a dangerous part of the Whitehaven Colliery. An explosion had taken place in the same pit a short time before by which several men were killed. This man had been a witness at the inquest and yet, on the very night after he was found smoking, to the imminent risk of himself and others. The foreman of the pit said he would not help making an example of him as the offence was such a glaring one, occurring soon after a fatal casualty, perhaps from similar carelessness. It will be interesting to note the current of English opinion as to the probable fate of Egypt. The Spectator, which for years has advocated the annexation of Egypt, now suggests the transfer of the Porte's suzerainty to England, or, as an alternative plan, the wardenship of the canal with the right of garrisoning Port Said, Ismailia, and Suez. A more practical solution is suggested by the Pall Mall Gazette—the conversion of Egypt into a Mediterranean Belgium. The treaty of 1840, by which the Levant was pacified and the present Government in Egypt established, would, it is thought, need very slight revision in order to render this scheme practicable. CAPTAIN MAYNE REID, author of the "War Trail" which was recently published in THE EXAMINER, who resides at Frogmore, England, has been granted a pension by the American government. He served in the Mexican war, and is now 60 years old. Every boy who has read Capt. Reid's stories will be glad of the author's good fortune. The boy who has not, has yet a treat in store for himself. Among the forthcoming novels is a new story, by the author of "Phyllis," "Molly Bawn," and a number of other popular novels of the same sort. The writer of these books, who figures under the pseudonym of "The Duchess," is a clever Irish woman, a Mrs. Maggie Arger. Her husband, who is of good family, was arrested several years ago on a charge of forgery, and sentenced to serve a long term in prison at Cork; his wife, left with two children and with scarcely any means of support, turned to her pen to eke out a livelihood, and wrote her first and best novel, "Phyllis," almost under the shadow of the prison where she had followed her husband. The new story "Phyllis" has been running as serial in Time, the London magazine.

Island Bank in liquidation. The question was raised whether the share holders are liable for the increased value of the share or the original £10 share. The point was not argued to-day as in view of the great importance of the question, the court has arranged a day upon which the counsel are to be heard. The Hon John Longworth, President of the Bank was under examination by Dr. Barker, St. John, Counsel for the liquidators as we go to press. Drowned at Summerside. On Saturday afternoon the body of an unknown man was found floating in the dock close to the Railway Wharf, Summerside. It was landed and Dr. Jarvis, Coroner for Prince County held an inquest. No evidence could be gathered showing who the man was, where he came from or how he met his death. A verdict of "Found Drowned" was therefore rendered and the body, on Saturday morning interred. Yesterday afternoon, two gentlemen arrived in Summerside from Port Hill. They had the body exhumed and we learn identified it as that of Capt. Hancock. They said the Captain left his house a few weeks ago enroute to Port Hill to take charge of a vessel. He had since been missing and information of his whereabouts could not be obtained. They believe he met his death after landing in Summerside. The body bore evidence of being in the water a long time. It was badly swollen and the face and hands were much disfigured. Special Notices. 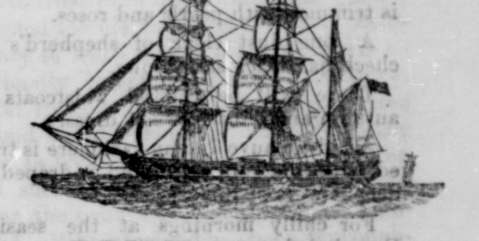
