Ontario Says Farm Marketing Schemes Legal Despite Fees

OTTAWA (CP) — The Ontario government maintained Tuesday licence fees levied under provincial farm marketing schemes may still be legal.

C. R. Magone, Ontario's deputy attorney-general, told the Supreme Court of Canada that in essence the fees are service charges levied against the farmers' selling prices for service rendered by the local marketing boards.

The fact that the charge may be passed along to the buyers of those goods and may take the form of an indirect tax does not make it invalid because it is merely ancillary to provincial legislation, he said.

Mr. Magone followed F. P. Varcoe, federal deputy justice minister, in presenting argument before the court in support of the controversial Ontario Farm Products Marketing Act.

WATCH CASE

The existence of some 14 Ontario marketing schemes covering 21 farm products is at stake in the test case. Other provinces are watching proceedings closely, fearing farm disposal schemes in all parts of Canada may be affected by the court's decision.

Those who oppose the legislation argue it is invalid—outside the province's jurisdiction—on the basis that the licence fees levied by the producer boards are indirect taxes, a field belonging exclusively to the federal parliament under the constitution.

Eight red-robed justices are hearing the case. Normally in these major constitutional issues, the full court of nine justices is present. But one of them, Mr. Justice Roy Kellock, is ill and will be away from court for two weeks. Thus, a rarity has occurred—a bench of eight to hear the case.

Mr. Varcoe argued that the legislation is legal and not in conflict with the federal anti-combines laws. Toronto lawyer J. J. Robinette, appointed by the court to present opposing argument, and Stratford farmer Theodore Parker who originally challenged the legislation maintain the schemes are illegal price-fixing arrangements.

Bible Society Work Outlined By General Sec'y At Meeting

Rev. A.H. O'Neil, M.A., D.D., General Secretary of the British and Foreign Bible Society in Canada, was guest speaker at a well-attended meeting held in Heartz Hall last night Dr. Lloyd Shaw, President of the P.E. Island Auxiliary of the society, presided.

The scripture reading was by Rev. E.C. Evans and prayer was offered by Rev. Canon J.T. Ibbett. The benediction was pronounced by Dr. O'Neil, who was introduced by Rev. E.M.D. Wheelock, District Secretary of the Society for New Brunswick and P.E. Island.

Miss Enid M. Morson was pianist.

In the course of his address Dr. O'Neil thanked the people of Charlottetown and district for their support of the Bible Society through the years. He referred to the general progress in Canada and noted that Canada was forwarding overseas for world work \$90,000 more per year than we were sending in 1951. Touching on the distribution in Canada, he pointed out that since 1804 in this country alone the British and Foreign Bible Society has circulated over 20 million Bibles, Testaments and Gospels in 111 languages. In 1955 scriptures were distributed in 74 languages in Canada.

Since 1914, 1,353,000 Testaments have been presented to the Service personnel, Army, Navy and

languages, the Bible Society enables the Church to minister to peoples of various races and cultures. "The two major problems are more translations and more circulation", Dr. O'Neil said. Scriptures are sold at 1/2 and 3/4 of cost or given away to the needy.

Dr. O'Neil will be guest speaker at the annual meeting of the P.E. Island Auxiliary of the Society to be held tonight in St. Mark's Church, Kensington.

F. E. I. Department of Agriculture

The Veterinary Service Division can be divided into eight main subdivisions. The various policies, regulations and programmes offer a wide variety of services to the livestock breeders of the Province.

This Division is an integral part of the Department of Agriculture and the Director is responsible to the Deputy Minister. The offices of the Division are located in the Health Center, 188 Prince Street, Charlottetown. The mailing address is Box 404 Charlottetown.

During the next few weeks a brief outline of the various subdivisions will be dealt with in this News Column. The breakdown of the various phases of activity within the Division are as follows: 1. Veterinary Service Policy, 2. Calf-hood Vaccination Programme, 3. Bang's Disease Control 4. Mastitis Control Programme 5. Prevention and Control of disease in all classes of livestock 6. Laboratory 7. Poultry Blood Testing Programme 8. Artificial Insemination. Due to the fact that new breeding clubs have been organized and are commencing operation we will outline first number eight Artificial Insemination.
