TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

News from Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Dec. 19.

Judgment in the case between the Dominion and British Columbia, regarding the ownership of the minerals in the railway belt, will be given before the meeting of Parliament.

The Department of Public Works is preparing a chart showing the scenes of wrecks during the past ten years along the island of Anticosti coast.

An order in Council was passed a few days ago cancelling grazing leases in the Northwest comprising 660,000 acres, owing to the failure of leaseholders to comply with the Government regulations. The decisive step will be heard with interest in the Calgary and Fort McLeod Districts where complaints were made that many of the leases were simply held for speculative purposes.

The Babson transhipment case has elicited so much comment here that the financial agent of the Customs Department will shortly visit Halifax and examine into and report upon the case.

Terrible Butchery.

LONDON, Dec. 19.

A despatch from Zanzibar says that in pursuance of the Sultan's orders four natives awaiting trial for murder were horribly and cruelly executed in the streets of the town. Their heads were cut off the bodies and left where they had fallen, exposed and unguarded, until the evening of the day of execution. The Sultan also ordered that 24 prisoners, including one woman who had been sentenced to life, be put to death in a similar manner during the next week, a few to be executed each day.

The British Consul vainly protested against the atrocities. The Sultan proclaimed that in future he will be guided by Mahomedan law only. He has bestowed the power of capital punishment on local governors, and orders that their sentences shall not be subject to appeal.

A Disastrous Outbreak.

LONDON, Dec. 19.

News has been received of an outbreak between the Ausha and Masai tribes. The former tribe excited the Masai warriors into making a cow lifting expedition, and during their absence the Aushas raided a Masai settlement, massacred the old men, women and children, and seized the younger women for concubines. They also carried off 14,000 head of cattle. The Masai warriors, returning from the expedition and finding their homes devastated, lamented for three days, and then commenced a war against the Aushas, which will probably last for three years and result in the devastation of the country west of Kilimanjaro mountains.

Discounting Bank Bills.

HALIFAX, Dec. 19.

There has been exasperation for years at the fact of Upper Province bills being discounted here, except at five per cent. discount, and Maritime Bank bills being subjected to the same treatment in the Upper Provinces. The Halifax Banking Company have made arrangements with Molson's Bank whereby their notes will be paid at par at any place in Canada where the latter bank has an agency, while notes of Molson's Bank will be taken at par at any place in Nova Scotia or New Brunswick where the Halifax Bank has an agency.

Taxing Foreign Goods.

LONDON, Dec. 19.

The Manchester Chamber of Commerce, by an overwhelming majority, have passed resolutions holding that all foreign goods should pay the same proportion of Imperial and local taxation, that they should have paid had they been manufactured in Great Britain.

Snow Along the Intercolonial.

MONCTON, Dec. 19.

The northern division of the Intercolonial is now clear. The Buctouche and Moncton road is completely blocked. There have been no trains for two days, and none are expected for some time. The engines are in Buctouche without a plow, and the track is covered with from one to two feet of snow frozen hard.

Off for Naples.

LONDON, Dec. 19.

Mr. Gladstone started for Naples to-day. A great crowd gathered at the railway station, and the ex-Premier was enthusiastically cheered when he departed for Dover. At the latter place thousands cheered him on arrival. The trip across the channel was made in a rough sea and foggy weather.

On the Warpath.

CALCUTTA, Dec. 19.

The Chittagong Hill tribes have raided the lowlands and killed several persons. An expedition consisting of 200 men has started out to punish them.

Died in the Penitentiary.

DORCHESTER, N. B., Dec. 19.

Beloni Therault, a prisoner in the penitentiary, sentenced at Madawaska in July, 1885, for life, for murder, died on Monday night.

Arranging for a Reception.

KINGSTON, Ont., Dec. 19.

The council and all educational bodies are arranging for the reception of Dr. Grant, who arrives on Saturday from the Antipodes.

Two Candidates.

AMHERST, N. S., Dec. 19.

A. R. Dickey, Liberal-Conservative, and E. B. Elderkin, a Third Party candidate, were nominated for the Commons to-day.

Cotton Factory Meeting.

MONCTON, Dec. 19.

A meeting of the stockholders of the cotton factory will be held on January 2nd, to take steps for the disposal of stock on which calls have not been paid.

To Hold a Meeting.

PARIS, Dec. 19.

The bond-holders of the Panama Canal Co. will hold a meeting on Jan. 29, to discuss the course they shall pursue in view of the company's difficulties.

Weather Bulletin.

TORONTO, Dec. 20.—10 a. m. Moderate to fresh south-west to north-west winds, fair cold weather.

Italian Immigrants in America.

The Osservatore Romano, of Rome, publishes the Pope's letter to the bishops in America with reference to the care of Italian immigrants. This letter says the Pope deplors the fact that many Italians, forced by poverty to emigrate, find themselves in a worse position than ever in America. A great danger attends their souls both during the voyage and on their arrival, owing to the difficulty of meeting priests speaking Italian. Being much preoccupied with these facts, the Pope charged the Congregation de Propaganda Fide to study the twofold question of how to promote both the religious and the material welfare of emigrants, and it has been decided to despatch priests from Italy to localities inhabited by Italian emigrants. The Pope declares that it will afford him great satisfaction if the American bishops will facilitate the task of these priests by referring to the Propaganda in regard to any changes required in their sacred duties. His Holiness concludes with a benediction upon the bishops, clergy and faithful in America.
