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Olson Not To Box Until "Everything Cleared Up"

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Ex-middweight champion Carl (Bobo) Olson declared flatly Monday he would not box again until he had "everything cleared up."

"Everything has got to be cleared up before I'll fight again, both this marriage business and the other suit," Olson was quoted as saying by Walt Daley of the San Francisco Call-Bulletin.

The "other suit" to which Olson referred is a half-million dollar breach of contract suit filed by Herbert Campos of Honolulu and for trial Monday in federal court here.

Daley, who wrote that he had talked to Olson by telephone, said the former champion blamed a potential divorce action for his knockout by Sugar Ray Robinson in Chicago Friday night.

"I just ask one more chance, with my own personal problems cleared away, so I can think properly in there, (the ring)" Daley quoted Olson as saying.

Olson visited his wife and four children at their suburban home in the city Sunday. After the visit Mrs. Olson who filed divorce action last month asking \$2,000 monthly support money and division of \$200,000 in property, said she and the ex-fighter were "going to see what we can do about our own case."

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Outlawing Of Guild May Finish New York Boxing

NEW YORK (AP)—The Boxing Guild of New York was outlawed, in effect, by the New York State Athletic Commission Monday in a move that could mean the end of boxing in New York if the managers refuse to yield.

Julius Helfand, commission chairman, after a nine-month inquiry in the sport delivered a nine-page decision, blasting the guild for its "vague and shadowy" activities and its "monopolistic practices."

Helfand, speaking for himself and absent commissioner Bob Christenberry, said "the Boxing Guild of New York, affiliated with the International Boxing Guild, is a continuing menace to the integrity of boxing in this state."

He said membership in the guild is "an act detrimental to the interests of boxing."

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NEW YORK (AP)—The 1955 baseball season, which began with Richie Ashburn on the sidelines for the first time in seven years wound up with the little Philadelphia outfielder on top of the National League batting heap, the official averages confirmed Sunday.

Ashburn, 28, batted .338 to become the first Phillies' player to capture the title since 1933 when Chuck Klein hit .368.

Well back in second place were Willie Mays of New York Giants and Stan Musial of St. Louis with .319 apiece. Mays was accorded the runnerup position on a .3189 mark to .3185 for Musial.

Ashburn, who ended the 1954 campaign with a playing string of 731 consecutive games, only 91 short of the National League record held by Gus Suhr, missed Philadelphia's first two games this year because of a knee injury suffered in an exhibition game.

Honors in the slugging departments were shared, for the most part, by Mays and Brooklyn's Duke Snider. Willie, last year's batting king, walked the most

home runs, 51 and compiled the most total bases, 382. He also shared the lead in triples with Dale Long of Pittsburgh with 13.
