St. Dunstan's University debaters Dave Campbell of Saint John, N.B., and Tom McMillan of Charlottetown will attempt to break a three-way deadlock for first place in the Maritime Intercollegiate Debating League this evening at Halifax.

St. Dunstan's, Kings College and Acadia University finished the regular schedule with identical 3-0 records. The winner of tonight's debates will be declared champion of the MIDL.

All three teams have prepared both sides of the resolution: "Nationalism is essential for the good life of the world today."

It will be decided by a draw in Halifax which two of the three teams will face one another in the opening round. The winner of this round will then debate the team which draws the bye.

The playoff is being staged at St. Mary's University. The SDU debaters are seeking the fourth consecutive Maritime title for the local university.

Shaw Asks Withdrawal

Freight Volume At Ports Higher

OTTAWA (CP) — November freight volume handled at Canadian ports rose 1.6 per cent to 23,875,100 tons from 23,497,800 in the same month of 1963, the bureau of statistics has reported.

Cargoes loaded for foreign countries rose 20.3 per cent to 3,497,000 tons, while freight unloaded from abroad was up 7.4 per cent to 5,332,300 tons.

Canadian ports handling the greatest volume of freight in November, with the November, 1963, volume bracketed, were: Montreal, 2,942,800 tons (3,765,100); Port Arthur-Fort William, 1,712,300 (2,331,900); Seven Islands, 1,630,800 (793,200); Vancouver, 1,530,500 (1,364,000); and Halifax 980,000 (610,300).

New Dwelling Starts Jump

OTTAWA (CP) — Starts on the construction of new dwellings in Canada during the fourth quarter of 1964 jumped 18.1 per cent to 55,388 from 46,904 units in the corresponding months of 1963, the bureau of statistics has reported.

In the same months, completions increased 4.3 per cent to 39,151 from 37,606 a year earlier.

Starts in the full year 1964 advanced 11.5 per cent to 165,658 residences from 148,624 in the previous year, while completions were up 7.8 per cent to 150,968 from 139,191 dwellings.

Residences under construction at the end of last year were, at 107,718 units, 11.5 per cent above the Dec. 31, 1963, total of 96,613.

Extending Authority

Peace officers with magisterial authority will be able to destroy a dog on the owner's premises, according to provisions of an amendment to the Dog Act promoted by Hon. Andrew MacRae.

The bill was given second reading and approved yesterday morning in the Legislature.

If the dog is a proven killer of farm animals he may be destroyed by the peace officer detailed for that duty who can enter the premises of the dog's owner for this purpose.

Liability Report Is Corrected

On a question of privilege in the Legislature yesterday, Provincial Treasurer Alban Farmer corrected a newspaper report, and a subsequent editorial mention, that the province had an increase of liabilities of \$4,403,124 in the fiscal year ending March 31, 1964.

He said that sinking fund appropriations of \$940,800 and interest income of \$274,416 were not subtracted along with ordinary account surplus of \$194,467 from the capital account deficit of \$4,587,291.

When these calculations are made, he said, it can be seen that the province increased its liabilities by \$3,128,900 and not by \$4,403,124 as reported.

Accused Posts Bond

A light docket faced Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Queens County Magistrate's Court yesterday afternoon, Gerard Francis Marne, charged with break, entry and theft, appeared to post a recognizance of \$500 and report under the Parole officer for two years. William Gillis represented the accused.

John Layton Stewart, Parkdale, who had pleaded not guilty to a charge of illegally backing his car, had his trial set to March 26.

The case against Edgar James MacIsaac, charged with theft under \$50 was withdrawn.

John Daniel MacPherson, 206 Grafton Street, charged with fraud, had his case adjourned to Wednesday, March 10 to allow the accused to obtain legal counsel.

Three men were charged with illegal possession of liquor and each received fines of \$20 and costs.

BOND REVIEW

The Canadian bond market moved slightly higher in light trading this week.

Short-term Canada issues improved with the 3 1/2 per cent bonds due July, 1965 closing at 99.26 and the 3 1/2 per cent bonds due Dec. 1, 1965 closing at 99.65, both ahead about 16 cents.

The amount of day money fell to \$189,000,000, off \$27,000,000 but the rate increased to 3 1/2 per cent, up 1/8.

Long-term Canada bonds were generally unchanged with Canada 5, 1975 closing at 99.50 to 99.75 and Canada 3 1/2, 1978 at 95.20 to 95.30.

Treasury bills were higher. The 91-day bills sold at 2.77 per cent and the 182-day bills at 2.50 per cent, ahead .03 and .06 per cent, respectively.

Provincial issues were off fractionally. The Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario 5 1/2 per cent 1964 issues closed at 99 1/4 to 99 1/2 and Manitoba Hydro 5 1/2 per cent 1968 at 98 1/4 to 98 1/2, each off 1/8.

The corporate market was generally quiet with few

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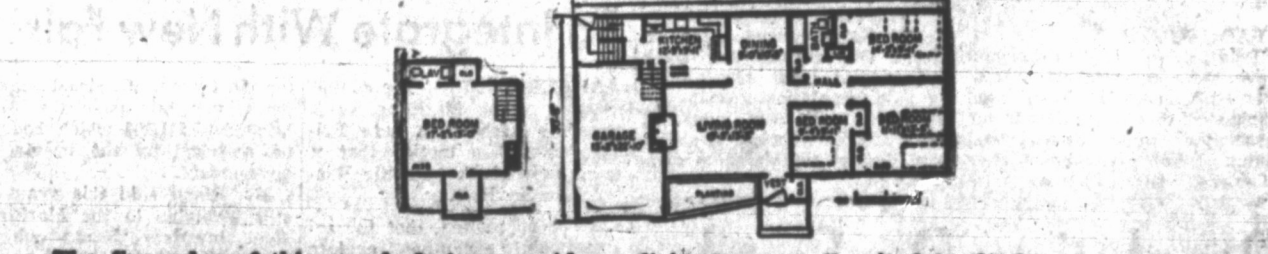
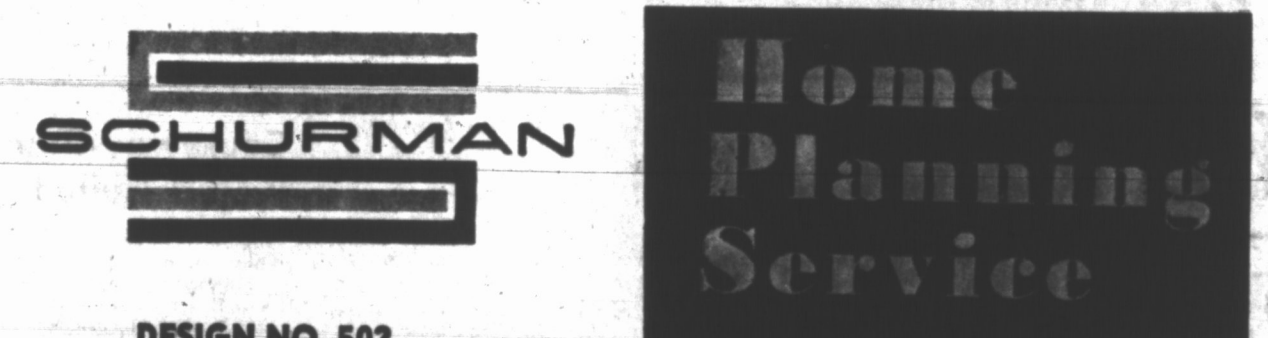
