

Office Slated To Open Mon.

Engineering consultants for the proposed Northumberland Strait Causeway will move into new offices on Kent Street, Charlottetown, May 8, it was learned yesterday.

Northumberland Causeway Consultants Engineers, an amalgamation of three engineering firms, will occupy quarters in a building owned by Daniel Tweed.

It was announced some time ago that the firm would rent quarters in the city and it was also announced at that time that the purpose in establishing here was "to design the causeway."

The firm is composed of Harry Acres, and Associates, Toronto; British American Consultants with offices in Halifax and Toronto and a Dr. Moir (first name unavailable) and Associates of Montreal.

12 Grass Fires Cause Concern

Louis Ranaahan, fire inspector, said yesterday that the last five days the city fire department has been called out to extinguish 12 grass fires.

"These fires are a nuisance to the fire department and the city as a whole," he said. "The fires are caused by children and their parents who are lighting any grass in lawns or fields."

He said that the majority of the fires were caused by children and that parents should warn their youngsters not to light any grass in lawns or fields.

In addition to the loss of time by the firemen there is the danger of an accident to the person lighting the grass or the equipment," the fire inspector added.

A sensational jump in the value of building permits issued to date this year in Charlottetown was noted by City Engineer Norman Stewart yesterday.

Mr. Stewart said the value had risen from \$38,950 for the first four months last year, to an all-time high of \$5,283,000 for the same period of 1963.

The big hike was sparked by the issuance in February of a permit for construction of the new Fathers of Confederation Memorial Building on old Market Square. The building will cost in the vicinity of \$5,000,000.

However, permits were also issued this year for four new residential units with a value of \$27,200. Alterations to residences cost \$32,200, and the value of commercial permits issued was \$75,200.

Charge Is Dismissed Against Trio in Souris

SOURIS — Three men charged with possession of liquor in a place other than their respective residences had the charge dismissed yesterday by Magistrate James B. Johnston, Kings, through lack of evidence.

Heracle Percy MacDonell, Kingsboro, charged with parking on the travelled portion of the highway, was given a reprimand.

Leonard John Cloney, Bristol, pleaded not guilty to wilfully damaging Irving Oil Co. property to the value of \$200, and his case was adjourned until May 15.

Leroy Sylvanus MacDonell, Charlottetown, was fined \$50 and costs 20 days on a charge of theft of a battery from Alban Gallant's service station, in all four cases Melvin J. McQuaid was defence counsel.

Plus Reginald Morrison, Charlottetown, again had his case adjourned to May 15. He had previously pleaded not guilty to a false pretences charge, and is represented by Allison Gillis.

Two men each charged with possession of intoxicating liquor not purchased from the vendors were each fined \$25 and costs or 30 days. They were Brian Wayne Oickle, Bible and Edwin Francis MacDonell, Elmira.

Milford Derrick Robertson, North Lake had his case adjourned to May 15. He is charged with driving a motor vehicle without a licence. Also adjourned to the same date was the impaired driving charge against Evrenoude Doucette, Souris West. He has entered a not guilty plea.

Seven persons were each fined \$20 and costs for being in possession of liquor in a place other than their own homes, and six others were fined the usual \$20 and costs or 15 days for being intoxicated.

The prosecutor in all cases was Deputy Attorney-General J. A. McGuigan.
