Trouble With Crofters.
BLOODY WORK FEARED.
EDINBURGH, March 26.
A band of 100 crofters, of Leads Island, off the west coast of Scotland, who marched to Orisay Park Forest, from which they had been evicted by the owner of the land in order to enable him to convert the forest into a deer preserve, and who entrenched themselves in the ruins of their homes, have prepared to stand siege. Yesterday the poor crofters were engaged in doing their utmost with the limited means at their disposal to rebuild the demolished homes which they formerly occupied in peace and contentment with their families. A large force of police have been collected and is en route to Orisay Park Forest with instructions to drive the crofters out of their entrenched camp at any and all costs. If the crofters resist, as they have definitely announced they will, there is a possibility of bloody work.

Her Majesty at Grasse.

Grasse, March 26.
Queen Victoria has arrived here. She was met at the depot by the Mayor and Prefect, who presented Her Majesty with a basket of flowers. The town was decorated with flags. The band of the 112th Regiment played British national airs. The streets along the route to the hotel were crowded with people. The royal visitor appeared to be in excellent health, and repeatedly bowed her acknowledgments to the people.

He arrived at this conclusion upon the evidence of Dr. S. R. Jenkins, Rev. Father McElmeel and others. Inasmuch, however, as the heirs had strong grounds for disputing the validity of the will, the costs of all parties were ordered to be paid out of the estate.
