THE rustic pavilion of the Phoenix Cricket Club, on Victoria Park, has been attacked by vandals. The doors and windows have been completely broken. Surveyor Douglass has reported the matter and thinks it would be well if the club would do something for the safety of the building.

JOHN DOYLE, who was yesterday committed to jail for larceny, laid information against a number of fellows who, he said, robbed a sailor named George Ward at the East end of the city. On this information, Wm. Corish, jr., James Goodman, James Praught, Fred Paul and Patrick Brogan were arrested, and an enquiry into the charge is now proceeding.

He was arrested on Thursday evening of last week for disturbing a public meeting, and it is now said his arrest was instigated by his friends, and probably saved his life, as the feeling against him is very bitter. Californians regard him as a curse. Intelligent workmen believe he sold them out to influential corporations, and only recognize in him a load-monthed scoundrel, who carries on a senseless agitation in favor of the workingmen for personal ends.

THE Butcher assault case came up before the Stipendiary Magistrate to-day. The evidences of Mr. Mark Butcher, Dr. Beer, Mr. Richard Butcher and Mr. Francis Stanley were heard. As matters stand at present, it is impossible to tell the result of the case as the alleged assault on Mr. Butcher appears to be without intention as far as Mr. Stanley is concerned. Another evidence is to be heard to-morrow, and judgment will be given. Stanley and Hoar were again admitted to bail.

WE were shown to-day the silver medal won at the late prize meeting of the Queen's County Rifle Association by Sergt. McDougall, of the Charlottetown Engineers. It was presented by the Dominion Team to the Association, and was competed for under their rules. The medal is a very beautiful one; is star shaped, and hangs on a blue ribbon, upon which are two silver clasps, one with the engraving "1879." On the front of the medal is the engraving of a rifleman, and on the back the following inscription: "Won by Sergt. E. McDougall, score 86, H. P. S. 100." We congratulate Sergt. McDougall.
