TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Khedive's Reception Freshwater Canal Cut

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

CAIRO, Sept. 26. The Khedive gave a grand reception today at the Ghizeh Palace here. The affair was a brilliant one, many of the supporters of the late rebels being present. Sir Garnet Walseley was expected to take part in the reception, but, owing to indisposition, he was unable to be present.

Bedouins have been giving much trouble in the outlying places, and are causing much depredation. To-day they cut the Freshwater Canal near Neisich.

[The Canal is important. It supplies Zagazig, Ismailia, and Suez with fresh water; these towns, and intervening places, being dependant on it for a supply of fresh water. This Canal springs out of the Danielta branch of the Nile at near a village named Mr. Borch. It then meanders through the celebrated Land of Goshen, passing a hundred villages on the way and the site of the ancient city of Heroopolis. It spreads fertility as it goes. On its banks gardens of fruit and vegetables flourish, and trees which give a grateful shadow to the traveller in a weary land derive nourishment from its percolations. As it approaches Ismailia it runs along a sandy ridge just a few feet above the grade on which the town is built, and to every little plot fenced round runs a ditch containing a wealth of Nubian soil and abundance of water. An observer of the marvellous fertility created in a sandy desert by these streamlets of water from the canal remarks that the effect of the nourishing element on the sand seems almost spontaneous. Whatever plant indigenous to Egypt is put into the ground this water causes to flourish at once. Wherever depressions take place in the irrigated plot and in Ismailia there small lakes are formed, and on these the lotus floats with its broad, green leaves and pure white flower, while the edges of the lakelets are beautified by evergreens, brilliant flowering plants and aloe that shoot their broad, sword-bladed leaves aloft side by side with azaleas, roses and cactus clumps. Especially is the reviving and creative effect of this Nile water observable in the public gardens of Ismailia, in the centre of which stand the waterworks. This garden, about twelve acres in extent, is a perfect little paradise. Pleasant walks are set down between fantastically shaped beds of flowers, and palm trees and tall shrubs make pleasant places for the shelter of garden seats. The Governor's house and the Khedive's palace are equally beautifully and advantageously situated. The surrounding country, its brightness and beauty depends upon the fresh water canal that winds toward it from the land of Goshen. These "sweet waters" gone, Ismailia and places bordering on the canal must fade away into the inhospitable desert from which it springs.]
