

Sir John Macdonald's Treble.

Can it be that the Sir John A. Macdonald who sailed from Quebec on Saturday was Lord Beaconsfield's treble? When Sir S. L. Tilley and the other Canadian ministers arrived home some time ago in England, the London journalist came to the conclusion—not unnaturally—that Sir John had accompanied them, according to the original programme, and reaped upon the first opportunity of celebrating the well known and really very striking resemblance between the Dominion Premier and Lord Beaconsfield. A London correspondent of the *American Register* at Paris, read of this in the London papers and immediately wrote of this paragraph following, which duly appeared in the *American Register*, to the great edification no doubt of its readers:

'Sir John Macdonald, the Canadian Prime Minister, is in London. The other afternoon, when he was pointed out to me at the Duchess of Northumberland's garden party—held in the pouring rain, I may add—I thought I was gazing on the Earl of Beaconsfield. The two men are curiously alike.'

This is interesting as a good specimen of the sort of work done by a class of correspondents largely represented on this side of the water, where they keep the rural press in New York news and gossip of what are known in their jargon as 'club life' and the 'beau monde' of the metropolis. That careless artistic allusion to the correspondent's presence at the Duchess' garden party, 'held in the pouring rain' would have gone to the heart of Thackeray.—*New York World*

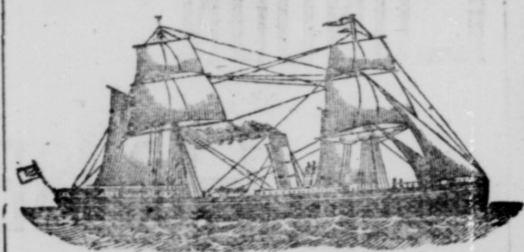
