**CO-OPERATIVE PORK PACKING.**

There was a large attendance at the meeting of the Bedeque branch of the Farmers and Dairymen's Association at North Bedeque last Friday. The principal matter before the meeting was the establishment of a co-operative pork packing establishment in Summerside, and upon it a most interesting discussion was participated in by Messrs. James Carruthers, W. A. Laird, William McNeill, Simpson, Donald Ross, D. H. Macdonald, James Staver, Praught, Pickening, and others.

The following resolution was moved by Mr. Laird and unanimously adopted: Resolved, that every school district should hold a meeting to appoint a delegate or delegates to attend a meeting to be held in Summerside, on Friday, the 28th inst, at 2 p. m.

After some further discussion, the following resolutions, moved by Mr. Carruthers and seconded by Mr. Macdonald, were unanimously adopted:—

Whereas, in the opinion of this meeting the question of establishing a Pork Packing Institution for the western portion of the province is of very great interest to the members of this Association and to farmers generally,—

Resolved that this convention appoint Friday the 28th inst., at 2 p. m., as the date for a general convention to be held in Summerside at which this question will be discussed, and the secretary be empowered to invite representative farmers from the different sections of the province to attend the same.
