Tignish Prepares For Yule Season

TIGNISH — The residents of Tignish are preparing for a bright Yule season as home owners and business establishments are going all out to add a festive appearance for the holidays.

Many new homes are being lighted for the first time. Receiving much comment as in the past is a large Nativity scene erected on church property close to St. Simon and St. Jude Church, and smaller ones signifying the true meaning of Christmas have been erected by home owners around the village. Santa seems more real to the younger ones, as he peeks out from under gaily decorative lights and trees.

Christmas is expected to be celebrated quietly as families gather to spend Christmas together. Many homes are welcoming members of their families for Christmas. For some there is the last-minute call of disappointment at not being able to make it this year. For many it will be their first Christmas away from the family circle, but their thoughts will turn homeward as Christmas Day dawns.

Nimble-Minded Marchand Has Key Post In Cabinet

MONTREAL (CP)—A nimble mind sending out sparks from under a shock of boyish hair—that's Jean Marchand, ex-union firebrand and now a key figure in the re-organized federal cabinet.

After years of union-building in Quebec, Mr. Marchand, 47, took to federal politics for the November election as part of the Liberal party's "new look" brigade in Quebec.

In Prime Minister Pearson's reshuffled cabinet, the man from Quebec West will head the department of citizenship and immigration.

Later he will take over a new department of manpower. Manpower and its rights have been Mr. Marchand's chief concern since the early 1940s, when he emerged from the social sciences faculty of the French-language Laval University in Quebec City.

JOINED UNION
Full of "progressive ideas" he plunged into the Canadian and Catholic Confederation of Labor and by 1947 was its secretary-general.

With religious barriers to confederation membership melted away, he worked to make the group tightly-knit and militant, and fought many a battle with the then-leader of Quebec provincial politics, the late Premier Maurice Duplessis.

By 1960, with the Union Nationale leader dead and a Liberal government of the province in power, Mr. Marchand was president of the confederation, now renamed the Confederation of National Trade Unions.

Port Increases Cargo Tonnage

HALIFAX (CP)—General cargo handling in the Port of Halifax for the first 11 months of this year has topped the figures for the comparative period in 1964.

National Harbors Board figures show exports of general cargo up to the end of November totalled 715,304 tons, almost 70,000 higher than in 1964. Imports of general cargo totalled 333,635 tons, about 10,000 up from the same period in 1964.

Total import tonnage handled over National Harbors Board piers by the end of November added to 4,581,841 tons, compared with 4,239,825 in the first 11 months in 1964.

Total export handling amounted to 4,515,982 tons, a drop of over 20,000.

Construction President Is Charged

NEWMARKET, Ont. (CP)—The president of a Brampton construction company has been charged following the electrocution of a laborer on a bridge construction in Kleinburg, Ont., Sept. 8.

Donald Graham, president of Graham Brothers Construction Co. Ltd., was charged with allowing an employee to work under unsafe conditions.

Alfred Zelinas, 42, of Brampton was killed while standing beside a crane that struck a 4,800-volt power line.

The Graham company, which was building the bridge, is also charged with operating a crane too close to a power line. The firm faces a maximum fine of \$5,000 if convicted.

Crane operator Theodore Wilbur of Moncton, N.B., was also charged with failing to comply with the construction safety act.

All charged will appear in magistrate's court here Jan. 26.
