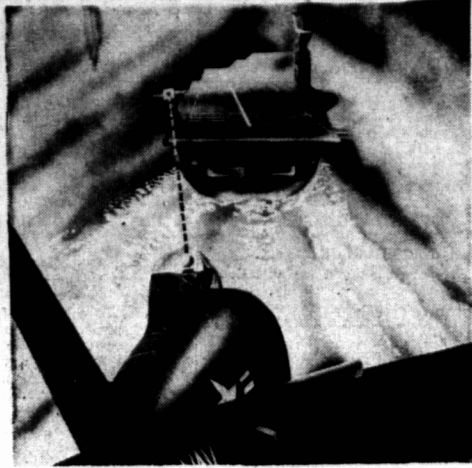


MIRROR AIDS PILOT

landing system, which contains a special concave mirror to be installed on all carriers and many land stations. The system replaces the old wiggling method of landing aircraft and already has reduced landing accidents and saved millions of dollars.

Freighter Brushes Passenger Ship

MONTREAL (CP)—An out-bound freighter Tuesday brushed the side of the Canada Steamship Lines passenger ship St. Lawrence about 20 miles downriver from Montreal. Neither ship was damaged and there were no injuries.

The incident occurred during dense fog about 7:30 a.m. The St. Lawrence was riding at anchor at the time and approximately 200 passengers aboard were having breakfast.

A spokesman for Canada Steamship Lines said the name of the freighter was not immediately available here. He said the vessel continued its journey after the incident. The St. Lawrence moved upriver to its regular dock here.

The spokesman said inspection showed there was no foundation for earlier reports that deck railings on the St. Lawrence had been ripped off and plates crushed.

Two Light Earth Shocks In Mexico

MEXICO CITY (AP)—Two light earth shocks Tuesday brought to 64 the number of tremors that have rattled the Mexican capital since Sunday's disastrous earthquake.

The death toll remained at 52 in Mexico City and 66 for the whole country.

Government and architectural experts began an examination of downtown buildings to determine which ones must be torn down for safety. Many already have been evacuated.

Some estimates of the loss ranged to 200,000,000 pesos (\$16,000,000), but repairs and demolition of shaky structures will boost that figure.

On Mount Ruapehu the Canadians have found what they consider an excellent site for high-speed skiing. This 9,75-foot volcano offers good skiing almost to the summit. From the crater, with its remarkable warm lake surrounded by ice cliffs, the Whakapapa glacier falls away steeply. For almost two miles it provides a firm, smooth surface free from obstructions.

By climbing some distance up a subsidiary peak and dropping down to the glacier, almost any desired degree of steepness can be obtained yet there is a good outrun for slowing up after traversing a measured stretch of snow.

WALF FOR BEST TIME

This is the area in which the Canadians plan to make their attempt. They are in training already, but do not expect to make a formal attempt on the record until August or September, when better weather should bring smoother and faster snow.

Even if the world mark is not passed, they will certainly establish a record for Australia and New Zealand. The Australian figure is 75 miles an hour and there is no recognized New Zealand record. However, skiers have been timed at more than 70 m.p.h. even in ordinary downhill races on the Whakapapa Glacier, so a full scale speed attempt should get well above this mark.

Some of the top New Zealand skiers are also expected to attack the record and may be able to give the Canadians competition.

For the general public, Clifford plans to set up measuring apparatus on less extreme slopes, so that those of reasonable ability will be able to obtain certificates showing the speed they attain.

Former Music Teacher Drives Winners In Harness Racing

MONTREAL (CP)—Bobbe Huntress is the first to admit she is a "scarce creature"—one of North America's five or six women harness-racing drivers.

Only three years ago she was just a music teacher in Gouverneur, N.Y., with a passing interest in horses. Now she spends 10 months of the year with them, either training her animals at Syracuse, N.Y., or racing them in the United States and Canada. "I love it," she says. "Perhaps when I'm old and rheumatic, I'll go back to teaching. But right now I wouldn't swap my job for any other in the whole world."

Here for the season at Blue Bonnets Raceway, Miss Huntress lives in a trailer—the same one she uses for transporting her horses from meet to meet.

"Neither the horses nor I mind the arrangement. It's funny sometimes though to see the expression of people's faces when the truck rolls into a track, I open the curtained door and a horse walks out."

Actually, her home-on-wheels is fitted for both uses. The shelves

fold up and the tables and bed folds down when the horses go aboard. When they're stabled, she has a television set, a refrigerator and a gas stove.

Miss Huntress says horses are "just about the world's nicest people" but she didn't realize it until late in her teens. "It wasn't until I was in high school that I ever rode. One afternoon a girl friend and myself went to the local riding school in Gouverneur and rented some horses for the afternoon. I've never been the same since."

Then she met George McLearn, who was working his trotting horse behind the school where Miss Huntress taught. They formed Huntress and McLearn stables, bought a horse and now own six animals, three in racing form, and three still in training.

It's a full-time job being caretaker to six horses," she admits. "I don't know of any other job that keeps you on your feet about 20 hours a day. That's about what it is if you drive in the 10th race at night and have to be up at 5 a.m. to feed the horses."

Will Seek World Ski Record In New Zealand Ski Centre

NATIONAL PARK, N.Z. (CP)—The team of Canadian ski instructors at Mount Ruapehu National Park in New Zealand plans to attack the world ski speed record within the next few weeks.

The present record is 98 miles an hour. Higher speeds have been recorded unofficially, but not under conditions to assure accuracy. The ski school at Ruapehu, largest ski centre in New Zealand, is under the direction of Harvey Clifford, top-class Canadian skier and coach. For the last six years he has headed the Ruapehu school during the northern summer and

Opening lead—queen of spades. Let's say you're playing in your regular Friday night game and you pick up the South hand. You don't suspect there's anything tricky about the hand because, after all, you dealt it yourself and you're not reading about it in a column.

Naturally, you open with a no-trump because you've learned it's better to send the right message right away than it is to bid diamonds and maybe not know what to do if partner bids a major suit or a no-trump.
