

MAHA Meeting Is Looming Near

The Maritime Amateur Hockey Association's annual meeting is scheduled for Halifax, N.S. Saturday and there are indications that this will be one of the 'hottest' MAHA meetings held in years.

Not on the agenda will be what action to take against last year's Maritime Intermediate hockey clubs which failed to have a winner declared in time to have a representative ready to play on the playoff dates set down by the MAHA officials.

Failure of these clubs to have a representative compete in the playoffs cost the MAHA considerable loss in playoff receipts not to speak of the losses it placed on the respective management of clubs that were ready in time for the schedule playoff. The teams they were ready were "left hanging" while several clubs dragged their own playoffs out in apparent disregard for MAHA playoff dates.

If a club doesn't intend to abide by the dates and rules set down by the governing body we feel they shouldn't be registered and thus declared "outlaw" teams.

Another proposal which is expected to disturb several representatives will be: to have the newly formed Halifax Junior hockey team, sponsored by Montreal Canadiens, granted a bye into the Maritime Junior finals.

This will be an independent team and will not play in any league. The MAHA frowns on independent teams and so why should they grant a sponsored such as this a bye into the Maritime Junior finals while this team does nothing for Maritime Junior hockey.

This team is being billed as a big step towards a higher calibre of Maritime Junior hockey. The feeling is here that it is step the other way when a professionally sponsored team is pitted against a strictly amateur junior club which couldn't hope to come up to the standard of play of the select junior team.

Ivan Doherty, president of the Charlottetown Minor Hockey Association, will be making the trip to Halifax. Mr. Doherty will be accompanied by Lloyd Hillier, who managed the Charlottetown midget team which competed in the Maritime midget tournament last winter at the local Forum. J. Pius Callaghan, a fellow staff member and past-president of the MAHA will be in Halifax Saturday for the meeting.

Pistle Pete is a six year old gelding with a mark of 2:07.4.

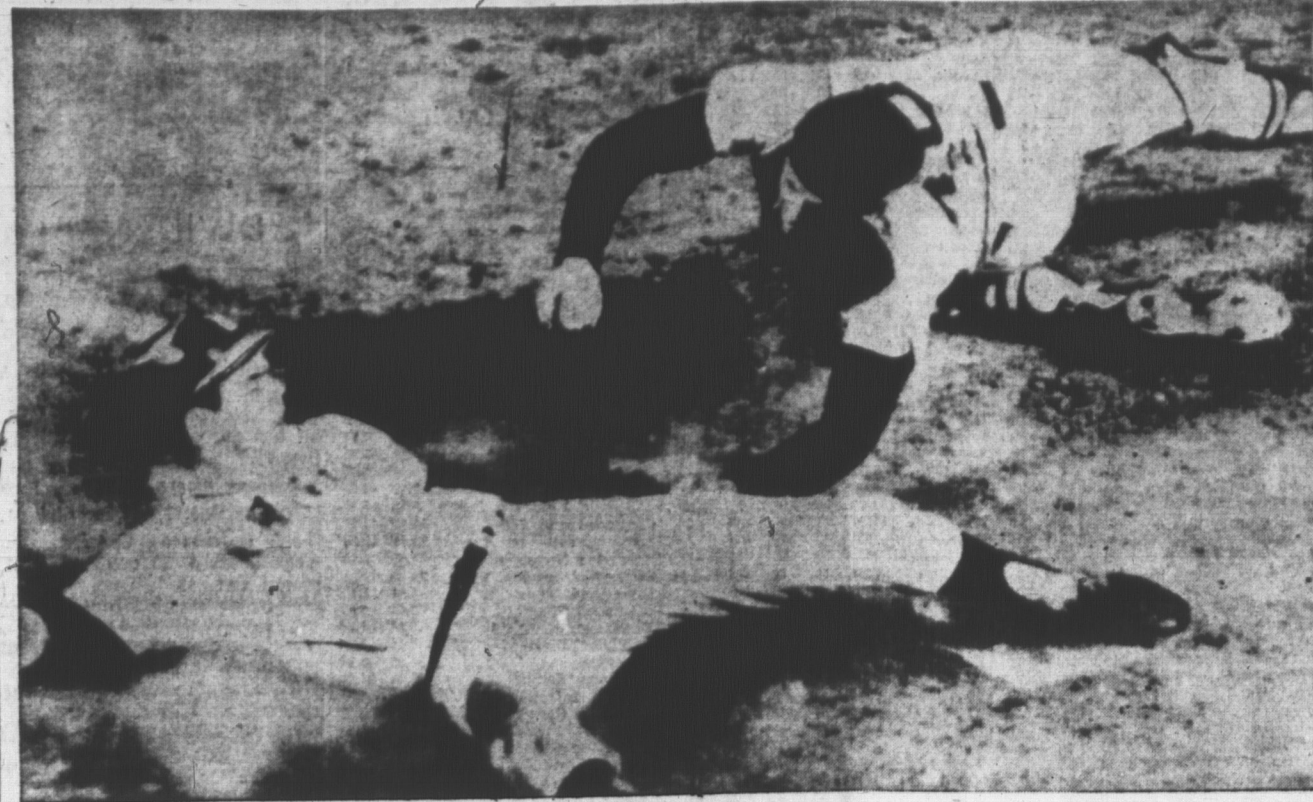

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Toronto Coach Bob Shaw Is Blamed For Argo Plight

By JACK SULLIVAN Canadian Press Sports Editor Bob Shaw celebrated Christmas two weeks early last year. He signed a three-year contract at a reported \$20,000 a year plus a \$5,000 annual bonus to lead Toronto Argonauts out of the professional football wilderness.

The date was Dec. 11. Shaw had won the head-coaching job over 20 or so applicants and the Argonaut office was bustling with enthusiasm. Argos had won only eight of 29 games in 1963 and 1964 and now they had a guy who had led Saskatchewan Roughriders into the Western Conference playoffs in those two years.

No, said Managing Director Lew Hayman, Argos probably won't make the Grey Cup final in 1965. Maybe, said Lew, they might hit the Eastern Conference playoffs this year. Yes, he added, Argos should be a real contender in a couple of years.

Then, on Dec. 16, Shaw returned to Toronto and skillfully fielded questions from reporters for more than an hour. There was no nonsense with him. At times he was careful, other times blunt and grim, and many questioners went away with the feeling that Argos might not be world beaters in 1965 but they'd certainly

be a well-drilled, hard-hitting, well-coached club. BLAME THE COACH? "I'm not in a position to say what is wrong with the Argos," Shaw said. He'd have to look over game films. "Except that they can't win," someone suggested. "They will," was the fast retort.

Let's see now, Argonauts have gone through about 110 players since training camp started in July, they've played eight Eastern Conference and East-West interlocking games, and have lost them all. They're the laughing stock of Canadian pro football and it wouldn't surprise anyone if they went through the 14-game schedule without a victory. Who is to blame? According to tradition, the coaches.

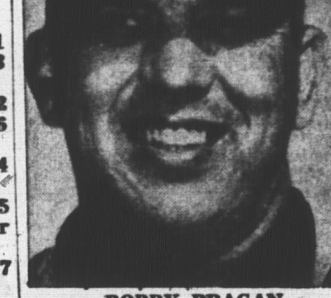
