STOCK AND POULTRY.

Diseased Twigs - A Celler For Root-Bores in Winter.

Lessening the ration injures the farmer more than the animal, as he loses the gain that would accrue from the fattening of the animal.

Small flocks of poultry pay best because they receive a greater variety of food, are not crowded at night, and have a larger area over which to forage in proportion to numbers.

The main point to consider in the prevention of diseases among stock is not to bring it on the farm; it may truly be said that abortion in cows is caused by the practice of buying cows to take the place of those that dry off.

Cabbages are usually buried, heads under, covering well with earth as a protection. They can be taken up and placed close together, roots down, and then covered with straw and corn-stalks, which permits of using them at any time during the winter.

FARM PROFITS IN WINTER

THE SNOWY SEASON NEED NOT BE A LAZY SEASON.

Money is Brains and Labor - The Science of Converting Grain and Other Food into Saleable Beef, Mutton and Pork - Interesting Figures.

The winter season is the period when farmers can advantageously devote a large share of their time to raising stock, though in practice stock is sold in order to reduce the number before cold weather begins.

When prices of grain are low the only way the farmer is to endeavor to sell it in some other form, and if he must complete with cheaper grain from the West he must endeavor to use as much grain as possible in keeping more stock.

The profit from the use of grain in winter feeding depends largely on the intelligence of the farmer. If he is intelligent he will always demand for every animal to market in prime condition he can make stock raising pay, even in a depressed market, because there is always a demand for choice, and half a cent more per pound in the prices obtained makes a large difference when several cattle are sold.

There is also a demand for good animal stock, and fat, for in addition to the extra cent or more to the price obtained per pound there is also the gain in weight. If a steer weighing 1000 pounds and the market price is \$10.00 per pound, and the condition sold for \$40, and can be made to increase 200 pounds more in weight, selling at 4-1/2 cents per pound, owing to the extra weight, the value of the steer becomes \$22, or \$12 more than the original value, which should pay for the food used to add the increase, while the manure, which at the same time becomes more valuable and really without any cost to the farmer. It may safely be stated, however, that a prime steer will bring more than the price named. The \$12 additional may appear as a small sum, but it is \$23.33 per cent, over the first cost of \$40.

The loss of time from inability to do all operations on the farm, and in the effort to make the grain and other food bring more than the market price by conversion into meat, stock, and other products, is a labor-saving device, and one that is not to be despised.

A GREAT HARVEST.

MANITOBA'S EXCEPTIONAL CROP OF WHEAT AND OATS.

What a Few Industrious People Have Accomplished in the Northwest - Effect of Western Progress on Eastern Trade.

There is now in Manitoba and the territories perhaps the greatest harvest that has ever been grown by so few people in the world before. It is estimated that in Manitoba there are 25,000 farmers, many of whom commenced life in this western land without capital a comparatively few years ago, and some of them with intelligence and knowledge or experience of farming which is, especially under the conditions of the Province, a calling in which both skill and intelligence are required. And yet these 25,000 farmers have produced this year, according to the Government bulletin for August, 22,125,125 bushels of wheat, 2,537,415 bushels of oats, 5,567,210 bushels of barley, and of flax 1,240,200 bushels, making, with the rye and peas, a grand total of 37,861,921 bushels of grain. This is an average of something over 2,300 bushels for each farmer. And this great crop has been produced without the expenditure of a dollar for fertilizers, manures, and with very small outlay for wages as the Manitoba farmers generally have done their own sowing and breaking. The wages of an extra farm hand for about 5,000 of the farmers during the two months' stacking and threshing about represent the wages outlay for this enormous crop. The greater number of the rest of the farmers did their own work with the aid of their families, and by "exchanging" with their neighbors.

In addition to the production of grain there has been a magnificent root crop, potatoes, turnips, cabbages, onions and garden vegetables, and the corresponding educational facilities from which no children are barred - here, too, will rise a Greater Britain - a worthy offspring of the grand old motherland across the sea.
