## Playground Figures Soaring To Record

The latest statistics on the City Recreation Department operated playground program reveal that all previous attendance marks are almost certain to be topped by the end of the 1966 season.

Director of Recreation, Jim Fox, points out that the total attendance on the five supervised play areas has reached 45,428, as compared to 38,349 for a similar period in 1965, and surpasses the 42,073 mark set in the 1964 season of operation.

"As a matter of fact," Mr. Fox adds, "we have already passed the total attendance for 1965, which was 45,298 and we still have two weeks of operation to complete the 1966 program."

## Principal Announces Appointment

The appointment of Iain Galloway as Associate Professor of French at Prince of Wales College was announced yesterday by Dr. Frank MacKinnon, Principal of the College. Professor Galloway takes up his new duties immediately.

Professor Galloway is a native Scot who came to Canada six years ago. After teaching at Mt. Allison University, he moved to McGill University where he taught French for three years while completing his Ph.D. in French language and literature. He was also chairman of the McGill committee for the junior undergraduate curriculum in French and examiner for the McGill senior high school leaving certificate. He has travelled widely in France.

Professor Galloway is already well known here, having taught French in the Prince of Wales summer school for the past several years. He is married and has two daughters.
