(Continued from Page 1) There should be more money paid to the teachers and he felt that all the money voted for the Department of Agriculture should be spent to aid that primary industry. Maj. MacDonald spoke of the excellent work done at the Vocational School but thought there should be far greater advertising of its possibilities in order to attract more rural people with what it has to offer them. On education in general he was inclined to agree with Hon. Mr. Darby that it was inclined to swing too far along the material lines and he wondered "how I could get along trying to pass the entrance exams today."

He tossed out a suggestion that it would be a good thing if a standard system of hand signals and road signs could be set up for all of North America. But he approved of the proposal to add R. C. M. Police to the force here and institute an educational program for drivers. But he was dubious of the value of a motorcycle patrol as he thought police in ordinary appearing cars would catch more breakers of the traffic laws. Holdaway scored the Islanders first goal and his first goal of the series at the 10:20 mark. Holdaway, Clements and Wiseman raced into the Glace Bay end on a smart three man attack with Holdaway getting away a hard shot on net.

Lockhart blocked but Clements grabbed the rebound and after circling the net centered out to Holdaway who fired a low shot into the corner from 20 feet out.

Beaudry, Hurst and Gordon came closer to making the count 2-1 shortly afterwards but were turned back at the goal mouth by Lockhart.

"Buck" Whitlock combined with Erwin Grosse to set up Bob Gray for the Islanders second goal. Whitlock worked a pass from Grosse and took his way from the corner to the side of the net before centering out to Gray. The latter converted the pass with a shovel shot from the crease.

A little over a minute later hard working Marcel Clements carried the puck over the Glace Bay line and centered ahead to Lyle Wiseman. The latter knocked down the pass and sent Holdaway into the clear. Chuck ripped home another 20 footer to make the score 3-1.

Erwin Grosse, the blonde speedster from Shawinigan Falls, fired out a pass from the corner to set up Bob Gray for the Islanders placed at dangerous places and not everywhere after somebody was killed because a driver was not looking. 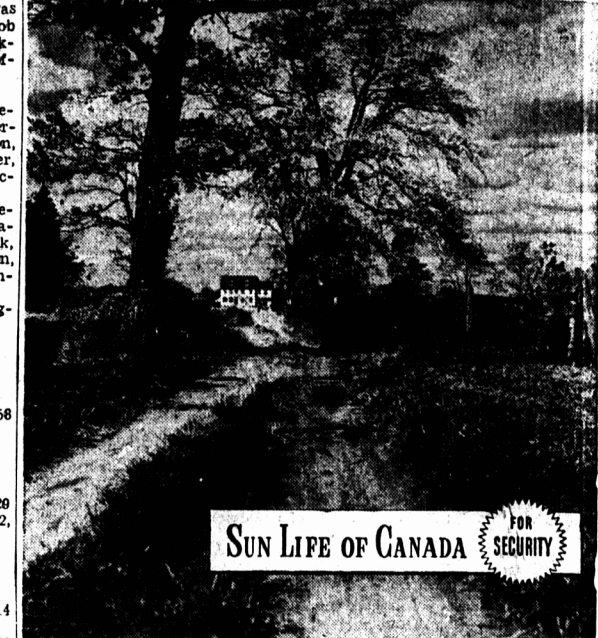
