The New York Herald ably seconds the efforts of the Cape Ann Advertiser in making it obligatory to furnish dories with sufficient food to sustain the lives of the fishermen when lost in the fog. It says: "One of the hardest and most toilsome vocations is that of the deep sea fisherman. His schooner anchors on the fishing grounds, and with a shipmate he is sent off in a dory to trawl. When he has caught a boatload he goes back to the schooner and deposits his fish and then starts out for a fresh supply. Sometimes, owing to fog or storm, he is unable to find his vessel or his vessel is unable to pick him up. Then his sufferings begin. As a rule there is neither food nor water in the dory, and men have been rescued after a week of starvation and exposure to wind and wave in these cockle shells. There is no reason why a watertight compartment should not be attached to every dory, this compartment to contain some concentrated nourishment sufficient to keep two men alive for three weeks. There is also no reason why each dory should not be compelled to carry a small keg of fresh water. But dories will be sent out in the future as in the past without either food or water unless the law steps in to the fisherman's rescue. Legislation such as we have indicated would save many lives yearly and prevent an awful amount of suffering.
