

Canadian Ship Leaves London For The Antarctic

LONDON (CP)—A white-painted Canadian ship, her siren screaming, slipped slowly down the muddy Thames Monday night heading for Antarctica. She carried the vanguard of the British Commonwealth expedition which aims to cross the 2,000-mile ice cap by way of the South Pole.

The tiny Theron, an 849-ton Halifax-based Canadian sealer, was specially chosen as one of the few ships ever built which could withstand the crushing strength of the polar ice packs when winter falls. Her decks and holds were jammed with the polar tackle ranging from husky dogs and tin kettles to survey airplanes and the latest radar equipment.

Below decks, in the tiny cabins, were Dr. Vivian Fuchs, leader of the expedition, and 16 members of the expedition party.

At Montevideo, the Theron will pick up Sir Edmund Hillary, conqueror of Mount Everest, and another New Zealand explorer.

Then the Theron will sail down through the southern ice fields to the fringes of the Antarctic, where the team will set up its first base.

WILL MAN POST

Eight men will be left there while Fuchs and other leaders return to Britain to mount the main body of the expedition, which will sail on November 1956.

In November, 1957, the whole party will set off from Velsel bay in temperatures never warmer than 90 degrees below zero to cross the empty waste from coast to coast.

LOVE TO KIDS

"Can you give my three kiddies love from mummy and daddy," he asked in a ship-to-shore telephone interview. He won't see them until next March, provided he safely escapes the winter ice. One vessel earlier this century was trapped for two years in the Weddell sea.

Says Mrs. William Woodward Sr., 67: "We have absolutely dismissed the case. We never considered the death of my son anything but an unfortunate, unavoidable accident."

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
