Recently he struck a lead of gold 14 inches wide which gives \$2,000 to the ton. Mr. Dryden is the son of Mr. J. N. C. Dryden, of the I. C. R., Moncton, and went to Arizona with his uncle, Mr. Robert Dryden, five years ago.

SOURIS NOTES—The schooner Prince Edward left Souris yesterday at 2 p.m. and returned last night with about 20 barrels of mackerel caught off East Point. Capt. McLean says all of the vessels did well.

THE NOTE DISHONORED—James P. Fairbanks, proprietor of the Queen hotel, Halifax, is out \$200 on a Philadelphia tourist party that recently visited that city and stayed at the Queen. Mr. Fairbanks took a draft in payment from the manager of the party, who at the same time handed the hotel man a card bearing his name and address, remarking that in case of any probable trouble about the draft he would know where to find him. The draft has come back dishonored, and the telegraph company reports that it can find no such man as named on the card. Mr. Fairbanks' idea is that the party were all right, but there is something wrong with the manager.

STAKED ALL THE CLAIMS—Victoria advices states that the steamer Topeka brings word that the Ogilvie has staked all the claims on Bonanza creek. The claims are panning out well. Both the Drea and Skagway trails are completely blocked. The Topeka had on board Prince Luigi of Savoy and party, who successfully scaled Mount St. Elias on July 31st. The steamer Portland is coming down from St. Michaels with two millions in Yukon gold on board. Surveyor Ogilvie has sent to the department of the interior a bunch of wheat grown at Fort Cudahy from accidental planting in the fall of 1895. It was all from one root and was cut fourteen inches above ground in September.

AT THE OPERA HOUSE.
