minutes to report to the paddock;
it's a good thing I don't need
much sleep in the daytime." It
was 6.45 in the evening, and
Haughton was staying at a mo-
tel only a few minutes drive from
Yonkers, where he races his 46-
horse string, which is, by the
way, only a part of his complete
racing stable.

Billy had driven nine horses
the night before, then he went
out to a late dinner and talked
with George Landers, who owns
Belle Action 1.58 2-5, winner of
\$167,887 and it was 2.00 a.m. be-
fore he went to bed. At 6.45 a.m.,
he was back at Yonkers, giving
his stable morning workouts,
which kept him busy until 12.30
in the afternoon.

NOT EASY

Then he had a luncheon date
with two or three owners for
whom he trains horses, then got
back to his motel at 3.30 p.m.,
took the telephone off the hook,
threw his clothes over the closet
door and went to sleep. It isn't
an easy way to make a living,
but in Billy's case it means a
living—and then some!

Last year his stable earned \$1-
021,000—the first time in stand-
ardbred history any driver had
ever cracked a million dollars.
The 35-year-old Haughton picked
up some \$200,000 of the above
for himself. Billy says: "I'm
troubled with this business is the
chopped-up hours. Everything
you do cuts into your sleep. If
I have to drive in more than a
race or two, which is nearly
every night, I don't eat dinner

before. When you are hunched
over in a sultry half the night,
the less you have in your stom-
ach, the better".

TROPHY

We have been asked to give
some particulars about the Mac-
donald Bred Trophy, which is
awarded each year to the top
driver at the Old Home Week
racing program in Charlottetown.
The writer, who was president
of the Charlottetown Driving Park
in 1937, had some correspondence
with Macdonald Tobacco Com-
pany, Montreal, whose founder
was a native Prince Edward Is-
lander who became a multi-mil-
lionaire and distributed his wealth
largely in projects for the public
good.

The company was kind enough
to agree to furnish us with a
beautiful silver trophy, which
would be presented annually to
the leading driver at Old Home
Week. The late Willard Kelly was
the leading driver in 1937, the
first year it was presented,
with 14 points. Earl Avery and
Johnny Conroy tied for second
place with 11 points.

In 1938, the leading driver was
Johnny Conroy with 14 points,
and the runner-up was Tyndall
Semple with 13, and Roy Barnett
was third with 12. Prior to 1937,
there was no Macdonald Trophy,
but in 1936 the leading driver
was Earl Avery with 13 points,
and he also won first prize of
\$20; Tyndall Semple was second
with 12 points, winning \$10.

IN TRAINING

Continuing our list of horses
in training at the Charlottetown
track, we present one of the most
successful racing in the Mari-
times last season—that of James
(Roach) MacGregor.

Last year he made 265 starts,
was 45 times first, 50 times sec-
ond and 48 times third, with win-
nings of \$12,051. Here is the list
of horses—Scottish Light, six
years old, 2.07 3-5, made 99
starts last year, was 11 times
first, 10 times second and 6
times third winning \$3,169. Owned
by H.R. Bevan of Charlotte-
town.
Royal Oayx 2.10 4-5, five years
old, made 40 starts last year,
was 10 times first, 14 times sec-

ond and 10 times third, winning
\$2,216. He is owned by James
MacGregor.

Sir Joseph, 1.58 4-5, 11 years
old, won \$2,157 last year, with
all-time winning of \$22,676. He is
owned by H.R. Bevan.

Miss Wilma Dae, p. 2.00, five
years old; made 55 starts last
year, was 10 times first, 13 times
second and 12 times third, win-
ning \$3,108; she is owned by W.
G. Barbour.

Salley Volstadt 2.12 2-5, five
years old (trotter); made 26
starts last year, was 5 times
first, 3 times second and 4 times
third, winning \$697; she is owned
by Ray MacCallum, Marsh-
field, P.E.I. Knowing horsemen
regard this as one of the best
prospects in the Maritime prov-
inces; she can really turn on the
speed.

Charidale, p. 2.10 1-5, ten years
old, made 48 starts in 1958, was
8 times first, 5 times second and
8 times third, with winnings of
\$1,952. He was raced last year
under the ownership of Stanley
Mayhew, Kinkora, P.E.I.
Anthony L., p. 2.10 2-5, nine
years old, and eligible to the 2.19
Pace. He is owned by Frank
Murphy of Charlottetown.
Driver MacGregor was born on
January 7, 1928.
