

# Parkdale Solid In First After Beating Saints 6-4

The Powerful Parkdale Flyers took a real stranglehold on first place in the Island Senior Hockey League by knocking off St. Dunstan's University 6-4 at the Sports Arena last night.

The win was the twelfth in 16 starts for the potent Parkdale crew and gives them a won-lost average of .750 well ahead of Summerside Aces, who slipped into second place without firing a shot. The loss pushed Saints into third place slightly ahead of B.Y.C.

Centerman Orin Carver triggered two goals, both on rink length rushes, to lead the Flyers attack. Coach Allie Carver, Willie Dunn, Erland Wood and Skip Carver got the others.

Blond Johnny Whelan sniped two of the Saints goals and singles went to Jack MacDonald and Gaston Roy.

### HEAVY CHECKING

About 630 fans sat through a fast crowd pleasing game that saw some heavy body checking in the first two periods. Tempers were on edge from the first and two mixups occurred in the middle period, although neither warranted major penalties. The teams settled down to hockey in the third frame and only one penalty was called.

Referees Don Whelan and Leith Jay handed out 10 penalties, five going to each team. Ray Hache drew three of the Saints penalties, two in the second period when he and Orin Carver staged a bout.

Hache got penalties for roughing and elbowing and Carver got a roughing sentence. Parkdale's Erland Wood, a defenseman of the old school, threw his weight around with considerable effectiveness during the game. He nailed both Gerald Murphy and Jack MacDonald with clean body slams and played tireless hockey for the Flyers.

### FLYERS GET JUMP

Parkdale got the jump in the first period firing two quick goals to take a 2-0 lead before six minutes had elapsed. Willie Dunn got credit for the first even though it was a gift from Saints' defenseman Ray Hache. Dunn fired the puck from the side-boards and Shepherd made the save but in attempting to clear the puck Hache shot it into his own net. A little better than a minute later at 5:29 Wood put Parkdale two up by catching the corner with a 30-footer after taking Dunn's drop pass.

Saints showed a little later that they could get quick goals too and when Orin Carver went off for interference at 7:57 Jack MacDonald teamed up with Joe Mahar and Ray Hache to cut the lead in half at 9:37 and 19 seconds later Gaston Roy, through sheer determination, batted the puck behind Roper to tie the score.

Skip and Allie Carver combined for a real picture goal in the last minute of the period. Allie stuck-handled his way around a couple

of Saints defenders at the S.D.U. blue line and slid a perfect back-hand pass to brother Skip who was steaming in on the left wing. Skip deked Shepherd out of position and gave Parkdale a 3-2 lead. ONE IN SECOND

Orin Carver got his first of his two goals in the second and it was the only goal of the period. The youngest of the Carvers made it look easy as he carried from his own line, dippy-doodled around Saints defense and caught the lower far corner with a perfect shot. Carver's goal gave Parkdale a 4-2 lead and the teams split four in the third.

Parkdale went in front 5-2 after only 40 seconds of play when Orin Carver scored his second on a play that was nearly a mirror image of the first. Junior MacLeod handed him the puck in deep Parkdale territory and Orin did the rest going the length of the ice and picking the far corner.

Johnny Whelan made it 5-3 at 5:28 when he came up with the puck from a scramble in front of Roper and beat the Parkdale netminder with a high shot. Coach Allie got a clear-cut breakaway at 7:28 and made no mistake whatever as he eased Shepherd out of position and the score was 6-3.

After that Saints fought back hard and their efforts were rewarded at 13:44 when Whelan got his second and the last goal of the game as he flipped home Ray Gionet's pass in front.

### CHATTER

Both goaltenders had their moments and Roper had to be hot in the second period when Saints peppered him with 12 shots. He stopped all of them. Shepherd made his best saves in the third stopping 12 of 14 drives.

Gaston Roy and Ralph Josey were carrying on a private battle for a time in the second. They almost came to blows a couple of times. Joe Mahar was playing on the line with Jack MacDonald and Whelan. Buck Davey is still out. Allie Carver will never get a better chance to score than the one he had in the third period when he was wide open net to shoot at when Shepherd last sight of the puck. He waited for two or three seconds and shot the puck along the face of the net and out the other side. Saints had just about as much of the play as did the Flyers but Carver, Carver, Carver and Company were sharper in close.

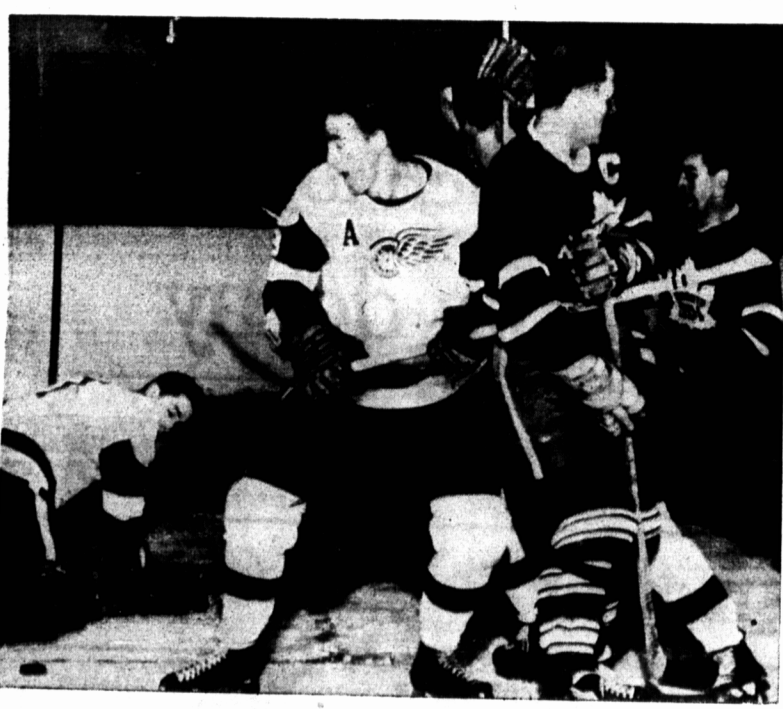

## Curling Officials See Need For Clarity In Rules

SEIGNIORY CLUB, Que. (CP) Top officials of the curling world got together in a week-end meeting and decided that only some clarifications are needed in curling rules.

At the round-table conference were representatives of associations in Scotland, eastern and western Canada and the eastern and mid-western United States.

One official described the meeting as a "truly historic and memorable occasion" when representatives of these different countries, meeting for the first time and representing some 300,000 curlers of different nationalities, agreed in complete accord on a subject which might be expected to result in general controversy.

The 22 rules which must govern curling play no matter what country, then set about clarifying them wherever it seemed necessary. The gathering included R. G. L. Harstone of Hamilton, past president of the Dominion Curling Association, chairman of the meeting; Sir John E. Gilmour, president of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club of Scotland; Lucius T. Hill, Brookline, Mass., past president of the Grand National Curling Club of America and director of the U.S. curling championship, and John Dutton of Winnipeg, DCA president.

## Canadian Champ In Dead Heat

MIAMI (CP)—Canadian Champ, owned by Bill Beavis of Toronto and winner last year of the Queen's Plate, Tuesday ran in a dead heat for first place in the eighth race at Hialeah.

Ace Marine, owned by Larkin Maloney of Toronto, ran seventh. Canadian Champ, ridden by Eugene Rodriguez, paid \$3,400.

A rink formed by the 'Lieut.-Governor, which is expected to include the Premier, will represent Prince Edward Island.

## Stan "The Man" Signs For \$80,000

ST. LOUIS (AP)—The St. Louis Cardinals wound up their 1957 contract business Tuesday by signing Stan Musial, the National League's highest-paid player.

The 36-year-old first baseman and outfielder presumably signed again for about \$80,000, his reported salary since 1951.

"I'm not so sure whether we signed Stan or he signed us," said General Manager Frank Lane, August A. Busch, club president, also was on hand for the signing.

## Berios & Costa Sign For Fight

NEW YORK (AP)—Featherweight contenders Miguel Berrios of Puerto Rico and Carmelo Costa of Brooklyn Tuesday signed for a 12-round elimination bout at Madison Square Garden March 22.

The winner will meet Hogan Bassey, British Empire featherweight king, in the semi-final round of the tournament to determine the successor to retire champion Sandy Saddler of New York. The survivor of the two bouts then will meet France's Cherif Hamia for the championship. Hamia, European titleholder, was given a bye into the final round of the tournament set up by the World Championship Boxing Committee and the National Boxing Association.

## Scottish Players' Champion Loses Job As Union Chairman

By KEN METHERAL Canadian Press Staff Writer LONDON (CP)—Jimmy Guthrie, the burly, 45-year-old Scot who has championed the cause of British soccer players for almost 10 years, has been fired as chairman of the players union.

The 220-pound ex-footballer entered a Manchester hotel Monday for the annual meeting of the soccer players union as the 3000-member organization's full-time paid chairman. Four hours later he left the meeting almost in tears after being dropped both as chairman and as a member of the union's committee.

Not one of the 55 club representatives present nominated him for re-election. The union, said without amplification that Guthrie's removal came after "reviewing negotiations and the outcome of several issues during the last two years."

BONUS STAND AT ISSUE However, it is known some members were unhappy at Guthrie's action last year in making public a union decision to take strike action unless demands for increased bonuses were met. Some members said publicly his action might prove detrimental to negotiations then under way. Later club owners were unhappy at Guthrie's action to £3 for a victory and 50 shillings for a draw. The previous bonuses were £2 and £1.

Two players of international repute expressed surprise at the union action. Trevor Ford, Welsh international, who has been feuding with the football league said "it seems hard luck on Guthrie."

Len Shackleton Sunderland star said: "Jimmy was always a bit of a bull in the china shop but he had a tough job."

Guthrie who has held the £1,000-a-year chairman's post since 1948 said "I did not expect this to happen after this time but it is just one of those things."

"The union has come a long way since I took over and now is a powerful body. I'm naturally sorry about all this but I have no grudge against the union. I shall continue to fight for the union with all the means at my command."

HE WAS OUTSPOKEN The hard-hitting bow-tied Guthrie was famed for forthright declarations in defence of professional footballers. Addressing a Trades Union Congress meeting Tuesday he said:

## First Of Three Bouts Arranged

NEW YORK (AP)—The first of three fights to determine Sandy Saddler's successor as world featherweight champion was arranged Tuesday when Miguel Berrios of Puerto Rico and Carmelo Costa of Brooklyn were matched for 12 rounds, Friday, March 22 at Madison Square Garden.

Winner of the Berrios-Costa bout will battle with Hogan (Kid) Bassey of Nigeria, probably within 90 days. The survivor of this elimination will box Cherif Hamia of France for the 126-pound title.

Bassey, British Empire champion, already has accepted an invitation to come to the United States to participate in the tournament. Hamia also has said he is ready to make the trip although his manager, Philippe Filippi, observes that French matchmakers may make an attractive offer to hold the championship match in Paris.

## Scottish Curlers Drop Decision To N. S. Rink

DARTMOUTH, N.S. (CP)—Visiting Scottish curlers, in the final stages of their Canadian tour, dropped a 62-60 decision to Nova Scotia curlers in their 19th match for the Strathcona Cup Tuesday.
