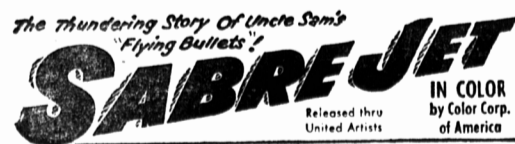

The passing of the late John A. MacDonald of Greek River occurred at his home on Jan. 26th at the age of 82 years. Although in failing health for considerable time, it was not until the last few months that his condition became more serious. He was faithfully cared for by members of his family throughout his illness. About 18 years ago he was called upon to bear the loss of his devoted wife and only about eight months ago his son, Hillis, passed away.

The late Mr. MacDonald was a son of the late Alexander MacDonald and his wife nee Catherine MacDonald. Following farming throughout his life as an occupation, he was also in charge of packing lobsters in different canning factories on the island for many years. It can be said that to visit the home was to experience kindness and hospitality.

He was a member of the Presbyterian Church at Peter's Road. There are left to cherish his memory and mourn his passing the following, namely, Maxwell and Artemas, Allison, Loretta, Mrs. Raymond Reynolds, Murray River; nine grand-children and two brothers, Charles in Charlottetown and Donald in Maine, U.S.A., also survive.

The funeral, largely attended, considering the condition of the roads after a severe storm, was held from his late residence on Jan. 30th to the Presbyterian Church, Peter's Road. The service was conducted by the Minister, Rev. M. C. Currie, who also conducted the committal service at the grave.

Mr. Louis Harris, a close friend of the deceased for many years, brought the message, speaking of that great salvation as recorded in God's word. He was able to speak comforting words in regard to the testimony of the departed as he referred to a time years ago when he told him of his trust in Jesus.

Heavy Damage From Ice Storm In Southern King's

Power and telephone lines in Southern King's and Queen's suffered extensive damage Tuesday night when a freezing rain formed a heavy ice coating on the wires. Connections were broken throughout the whole district in the early evening and were still out late yesterday.

The power line from Charlottetown, Montague was broken in numerous places, with a larger proportion centered in the Sparrows Road area where the Montague crew of the Maritime Electric were working yesterday. Falling branches and trees have added to the weight of ice broken off branches which, falling across lines, increased the damage manifold. Because of the damage the main line from Charlottetown, and the whole eastern area was without power, but it was hoped that it might be resumed partially last evening.

Telephone and telegraph communications were also cut off owing to the storm. However telegraph lines were restored about noon yesterday.

Telephone lines also received extensive damage, particularly in the Alberry Plains, Summerville, Newport area where a large number of wires are down.

Some live telephone poles were down in the same area.

Crews were out working to re-establish communications, but there was little hope that it would be completed last evening.

Many ornamental trees suffered severe damage with the breaking off of large branches under the excessive weight of ice. These falling on communication lines and across roads added greatly to the difficulties of the extended freezing snow.

Road travel on main highways was also hazardous and dangerous owing to the ice. Traffic proceeded slowly but even then many cars to increase the worries of motorists.

Conditions improved before noon when rising temperatures melted the ice making travelling easier and halting damage to wires.

South of Montague there were occasional breaks in telephone wires but damage was not extensive.

St. Columba and Vicinity

During this storm emergency cases came up at King'sboro when two women had to be taken to Souris Hospital. Approve Warren U. S. Chief Justice

WASHINGTON, (AP) — The Senate judiciary committee Wednesday approved the nomination of Earl Warren, former Republican governor of California, to be chief justice of the United States. By a vote of 12 to 3, the committee recommended Senate confirmation of Warren's nomination, submitted by President Eisenhower last Jan. 11.

Senate Republican leader William Knowland of California said earlier, in anticipation of the committee's action, that he hoped to bring up the appointment in the Senate before end of the week, probably Friday. Knowland predicted overwhelming Senate approval.

Roosevelt Ordered To Support Wife

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — James Roosevelt, pictured by his estranged wife, Romelle as a pill-an-derer and juggler of finances, was ordered Wednesday to pay her \$1,625 a month temporary support. She had asked \$3,500. He had said his income is only about \$2,200. The sum is to support her and their three young children pending trial of their separate maintenance suits.
