TORONTO

TORONTO (CP)—The stock market had its seventh decline Thursday in 11 sessions amid moderate trading. Prices in all sections varied gradually throughout the day and about 15 minutes before the close the heaviest selling of the session pushed most prices to their lows.

The base metals index was off 1/4 points, led by International Nickel's 1/4-point loss to 83 3/4. Other seniors moved down in a fractional range. Coppers were considerably lower with Campbell Chibougamau losing 20 cents and several others off 10-15 cents. Uraniums, junior base metals and golds also lost ground although the gold index recorded a gain of a few decimal points. Trading among mining issues was fairly active. The final volume of 2,294,000 shares was a bit heavier than Wednesday's 2,250,000.

Western oils were led down by Home Oil B's 1/4-point loss at 19 1/4. Lower-priced stocks moved down in a 50-cent range. There were few gains. Index changes: Industrials off 3.23 to 435.85; golds up 12 to 79.49; base metals off 1.56 to 170.86; western oils off 0.81 to 163.97.

Oils generally were off fractionally. Royal Bank at 67 1/4 and Canadian Bank for Commerce at 46 1/4 gained 1/4 each.

Most pennies lost from one to three cents. The exchanges' closing average showed banks up 0.07 at 49.25, utilities off 0.2 at 137.1, industrials off 3.9 at 255.9, combined off 2.0 at 216.3, papers off 1.19 at 74.99.

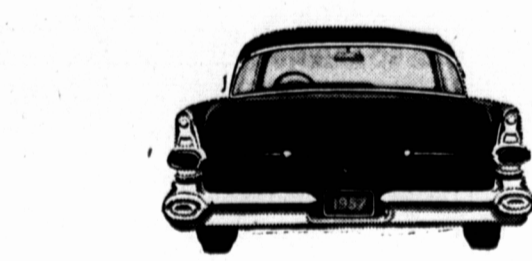
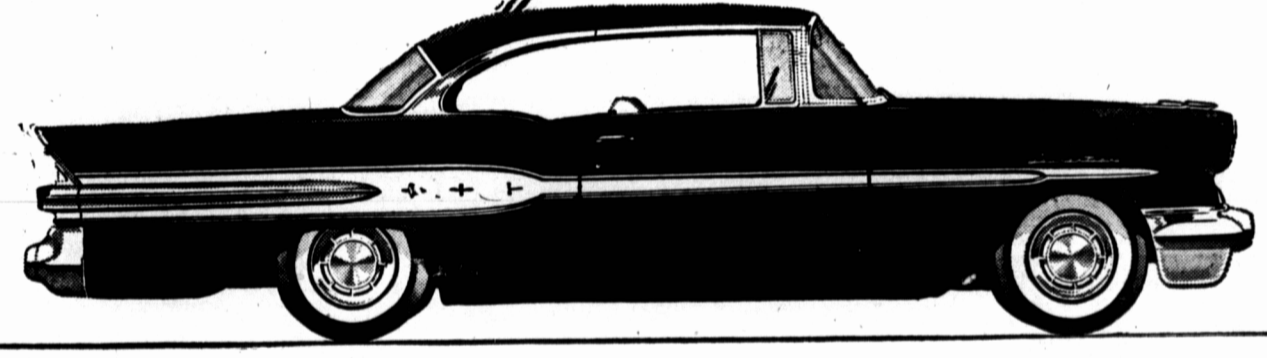
