DISCOVERER OF KLONDYKE GOLD HAS PASSED AWAY.

VANCOUVER, June 19.—George Carmack, discoverer of the Klondyke gold fields, died recently at the Royal Victoria Hospital, Haro street. He was sixty-two years of age. The famous northern pioneer with characteristic courage had fought death since he was stricken with pneumonia and was removed to the hospital from the Hotel Vancouver. His wife, who has been his constant companion for many years, moved to the hospital and was with him when death occurred.

Mr. Carmack's great discovery was made Aug. 17, 1896, on Bonanza Creek and led to the mining of \$200,000,000 from the Klondyke district. In company with "Skookum Jim," an Indian, he was prospecting in the valley of the Klondyke. The first pan of dirt or beach for which he had been searching for the best years of his life. The news of the great strike brought thousands to the Yukon and Alaska, and resulted in populating these districts with hardy and determined men. He profited richly by his discovery, staking many claims, which proved to be rich in gold.

Prospected Early. Mr. Carmack was born in Contra Costa county, California, Sept. 24, 1859. He spent the early part of his life prospecting in California. Later journeying north, where he worked a livable prospect for eleven years, in fishing and prospecting. Returning to Seattle, he retained as momentous, twenty-two nuggets washed out of Bonanza Creek in the first pans of pay dirt. In 1909 he had these made into a golden telegraph key, which was presented to President Taft. Pressing this key at Washington (D. C.) the famous Asaska-Yukon-Pacific Exhibition at Seattle.

Lead Was Followed. The discovery had a great effect on the history of the Pacific coast bringing thousands of people to Vancouver and Seattle and had a decided effect on the development of these two cities.

Mr. Carmack was one of the most picturesque characters of a fast-dying race of early prospectors of the Pacific coast. He was known throughout British Columbia and his name was familiar to mining men in every town of importance on the continent. Since his discovery on Bonanza Creek, prospectors have had great faith in his luck, staking claims near his own and believing implicitly in his ability to stake lucky claims.

"CORPSE" CAME TO LIFE. ROCHDALE, Eng., June 17.—Memories of a remarkable case of a "corpse" coming to life are recalled by the death of Mr. Albert Helwood, an undertaker, of Edenfield road, Rochdale. In May, 1907, he was lodging in Dane street, Rochdale, contracted a chill, and pneumonia developed. About 7 a. m. the young man apparently died, and his brother and sister began to make arrangements for the funeral. Three hours after the "death" Mr. Heywood arrived at the house to make the requisite measurements for the coffin. Having measured the body once, he was about to do so again for the purpose of checking the figures when he was startled by seeing a slight movement. Hardly able to believe his eyes, he examined the body more closely, and noticed that the closed eyelids twitched a little. Running out of the room, he cried out to the brother and sister: "He is living; he is not dead!" The brother immediately ran for the doctor, and the sister, hurrying to the bedside, dipped the hands of the "corpse" in cold water, whereon the "dead" man said very feebly that he was cold. At this the sister fainted, overcome with joy. Mr. Heywood took what steps he could to revive the "corpse" whose subsequent recovery was complete.

PATIENT WIFE RECEIVES \$1,350. Although her husband enlisted for overseas service in August, 1915, Mrs. Thomas Doyle of Calgary has just received payment of separation allowance covering the period of four years which he was away from home. Among the thousands of claims for war adjustment handled recently by the Dominion Command of the G.W.V.A., that of Mrs. Doyle is somewhat out of the ordinary. Doyle first enlisted at Kamloops, B.C., in April, 1915, with the 102nd Rocky Mountain Rangers. He was later discharged for a minor offence, a frequently used means of punishment. In the early days of the war, in order to re-enlist assumed the name of Hector McLean. He re-enlisted in Vancouver, B.C., with the C.A.M.C., without disclosing the fact of being married or of having previously enlisted. Proceeding overseas he made an arrangement with friends in England to receive his assigned pay in order that he could not be forwarded to his wife. Doyle, alias McLean, went to France with the Fourth Division, C.A.M.C., Motor Transport, early in 1916, and it was not until he was discharged from the army at Montreal in July, 1919, that he attempted to put forward a claim on behalf of his wife under his correct name. The necessary affidavits were secured, but the authorities in the course of investigations to verify the statements discovered a Mrs. McLean, former friend of Mrs. Doyle. Some confusion existed owing to an alleged statement from Mrs. McLean to the effect that Mrs. Doyle had told her that she was not receiving separation allowance from her husband. It subsequently developed that Mrs. Doyle had stated that she was not receiving separation allowance from the government. The matter was referred to the G.W.V.A., and after representations had been made by that body, cheques covering separation allowance and dependents' portion of war service gratuity, amounting in all to about \$1,350, were authorized by the Department of National Defence.
